The wreckage of the bombshell that was thrown into the public school situation by Wednesday night's vandalism in the high school building is being fast cleared away, and the mystery of the identity of the perpetrators and the plot behind it were cleared up late yesterday when five well-known high school boys made a complete confession in District Attorney Robert's office before officials and the members of the school board.

might were influenced by the misguided notion that such acts would in some way aid the deposed teachers' cause by influencing the school board. The boys who are now very penitent did not dream of the whirlwind of indignation the vandalism would cause, and that such swift action in investigation would follow on the part of the school board and authorities.

The names of the youths are withheld by the school board and officers, and the board, for the good of the schools, will not prosecute them, for the present at least, but charges against them it is understood, will be held in abeyance during future good conduct. It is said that the misguided and now sorry youths have promised to do everything in their power to aid in promoting better feeling in the schools controversy.

They were caught in the swift dragnet investigation that was started yesterday morning by the school board. District Attorney Robert, of Police Timothy and Sheriff Terrell. This investigation even included the taking of thumb prints off the doors that were paled onto the assembly room platform, by R. J. Schrader of Roseburg, a fingerprint expert, who at times acts as a deputy sheriff of this county. One by one the suspected youths were rounded up and into the district attorney's office.

The gray paint was removed from the desks and seats in the assembly room yesterday, and that room was in use again today as usual. It developed that this paint caused little damage. "This affair is a closed incident said a school board member who came out from the conference in Mr. Robert's office late Thursday afternoon. The guilty boys have cleared up everything and there will be a better feeling from now on."

vanced to within a few hundred yards of the Wesel bridgehead. The regulars drove the reds south across the Lippe river and southeast out of Lippe Schloss. In the meantime, government artillery opened fire upon the workers.

Artillery Opens Fire In the meantime government artillery opened fire upon the workers headquarters at Lippendorf and partially destroyed them. Working southward from Lippe Schloss and eastward from Lippendorf, the regulars began a double flank attack which swept the reds back. An armored train pushed along toward the bridge across the Lippe river and kept up a steady fire on the workers. Many shells fired by the workers' artillery flew wild during this struggle.

Reorganization Fails

BERLIN, Mar. 25.—Inter-party deliberations looking to the re-organization of the German government had been fruitless up until 7 o'clock this evening. Unexpected attacks on Vice Premier Schiffer and increased discussion in the wing of the socialist party, led by Philipp Scheidemann, former chancellor, featured the day.

A wide gap developed between the Berlin contingent of the right socialists and the party's representatives who had supported Gustav Noske, former minister of defense at Stuttgart. The former faction is made up of followers of Dr. Scheidemann. The left wing of the right socialists is openly rebelling against the attitude of the party's representatives in the government, who are accused of attempting to make reservations to the terms under which the strike was ended.

Berlin party leaders declare the men from Stuttgart have a too remote idea of the labor situation in this city and appeal for the acceptance of the terms laid down by Herr

report that the democrat national committee was raising a ten million dollar campaign fund and added that there were evidences of a like situation in the republican organization. "But Chairman Cummins of the democratic national committee has denied that story," interjected Senator Harrison, democrat, Mississippi. Senator Chamberlain, democrat, Oregon, interrupted Senator Borah's reading of a list of names of alleged contributors in General Wood's campaign fund to ask if some of them were not giving money for political activities in both parties.

"They usually do," Senator Borah said. Democrat Aids Wood "Edward I. Doherty, head of great oil interests in Mexico, is named here as a contributor to General Wood's funds on the republican side and he himself is a candidate for election to the democratic convention as dele-

gate at large from California. These gentlemen usually look to the protection of their interests. Mexico is likely to bulk large in the next campaign."

"I believe this is a national peril; I intend to get the facts out even if I have to do it in a brutal or crude way. Candidates who accept favors like these are called upon to return them after they get elected."

\$10 Per Vote

"Now, I have a lot of telegrams from South Dakota concerning the primary there this week, which I'm not going to read. They indicate that for every vote cast in that primary for Wood or Lowden, \$10 was spent. It cost that much."

Senator Sterling, republican, South Dakota, interrupted. "I cannot let the inference go out that the people of South Dakota have yielded to bribery," he said. "I'm not denying that money has been spent. Immense sums can be used for newspaper advertising and printer's ink. That there has been any purchase of votes I do not concede." "I haven't intended to say that," Senator Borah returned. "I do say the effect of this expenditure is to corrupt the electorate. If the money had not been spent the results there would have been different."

Turning to his reports from Indiana the Idaho senator said that "testimonial advertising indicates a descent to actual personal corruption," of voters.
