HOOVER AS A CANDIDATE

THE MAIL TRIBUNE was one of the first newspapers in the state to come out for Hoover. When this was done no one seemed to know what Hoover's politics were. We didn't. We supported him simply because in our opinion he was the man best fitted for the job.

Everything that Hoover has since said, everything that we have since learned of the man, has only confirmed and strengthened our opinion. His splendid record of disinterested and unselfish service during the war, his support of the treaty and the league of nations, with only those reservations which the protection of essential American interests demands, his high minded and courageous refusal to play politics and court favor with machine politicians, in either camp, all these things only increased our enthusiasm for his candidacy because they represented principles in which we believed.

Now Mr. Hoover has consented to be a candidate as an independent republican. We are not so simple minded as to expect those prominent Democrats who have already endorsed him to continue their support. Partizan prejudices are still strong in the higher political circles of both parties.

But we do expect, in fact we are convinced, that if Hoover is nominated he will draw a support from the American people, men and women, regardless of party, as no other man would. For the strongest sentiment in the American rank and file today is an aversion to the old-fashioned, viciously partizan political game. The present humiliating position of this country today, the growing unrest, is largely its product.

And Hoover would destroy all that. His nomination would automatically clean the decks, put the Murray Cranes and the Penroses on one side and the Murphys and Sullivans on the other, into the discard; give the long-suffering public in this country what they so ardently wish—a new political deal all around.

Hoover would be his own boss. If nominated it will be not because of the Republican machine, but in spite of it. Having no purely political aids to thank, he would have no purely political debts to pay. If elected the country would have what it sorely needs, a president representing no party faction, but the American people.
