Marketing is the greatest problem confronting the farmer today. To meet this situation the farmers of America are fast perfecting an organization which they hope will meet this urgent need. This organization is the Farm Bureau.

Jackson county was one of the first counties in the state of Oregon to see the merits of this young organization and for over a year now many prominent farmers have been meeting regularly and devoting their time and energies to the many problems confronting the Jackson county farmer.

One by one these men have taken different questions, first hog market, next the fertilizer question and in a small way the breed problem at the same time with a marked success. They have taken hold of the marketing of the county and are going to make an exerted effort to get the cattlemen closer together to work out a better marketing system.

An inter-county meeting was recently held between representatives from Jackson and Klamath counties in Oregon and Tehama, Shasta and Siskiyou counties in California for the purpose of discussing the merits of the Australian auction system, which is working very successfully in other places. The Jackson county representatives to this meeting were Geo. Owens, Ashland; J. J. Munn, Ashland; Miles Cantrill, Ruth; D. D. Lowe, Talent; C. C. Cate, Madras; R. D. Flaherty, Medford and B. Paul, Medford.

This committee has called a meeting at the library, Medford, Oregon, Saturday, April 3, at 2 p. m. They urgently request every cattleman in the county to attend this meeting so that steps may be taken to better cattle marketing in the county.

ALL IS READY FOR EASTER EGG HUNT IN PARK SATURDAY

All arrangements have been completed for the big Easter frolic for Saturday. The eggs are ready, the band is ready, the boy scouts are ready, the militia is ready, Mr. King's program is ready, all prizes are ready and the kiddies are more than ready. Every child in the community is urged to come to the city park block this Saturday, April 3, and be on hand at two o'clock sharp. At that time the Washington school bell will give the signal for the Easter hunt to begin.

Children of 3, 4, 5 and 6 years should be on the side lines of the city park block. Those of 7 and 8 years in a line at the library block and the ones that are 9 and 10 years of age lined up on the Washington school grounds. It will be a beautiful picture to see these three lines go "over the top," when the bell of the Washington school peals forth its signal.

The children above ten years will have to be patient and watch this part of the frolic along with the grown-ups. When this event is over the boy scouts will admit all grammar grade pupils from the Medford schools and from all the rural school districts to the grounds. Following is the order of athletic events:

1. Egg rolling contest for boys and for girls; open to all.
2. Egg race for boys and for girls. To be run as a potato race.
3. Sack race for boys.
4. Obstacle race for boys.
5. Wheel-barrow race for boys.
6. Pillow fight for boys.
7. Indian club race for girls.
8. Twenty-five yard dash.
9. Fifty yard dash.
10. One hundred yard dash.

Prizes For boys—Spaulding base ball mask, steel fishing rod, fish hooks, 1 card flies and 1 card spinners; Spauldings' base ball bats; Spauldings' base ball mits; Spauldings' base balls. For girls—Novelty head necklaces, wild flower baskets. The above prizes are on display in the window of the Medford Furniture & Hardware store.

Rules of Contest Two contestants from each com-

munity outside of Medford, and one from each of the four Medford schools may enter in each event.

One contestant may enter not more than two events.

Names of contestants and their addresses should be mailed to Chas. A. King, High School Bldg., Medford, Oregon, not later than Friday. However, late entries may be made at 2 o'clock Saturday between 10 and 12 o'clock.

In order to allow the children of the rural districts an even chance with the children of Medford to compete for the prizes offered for the prettiest and most artistic plate of eggs, the time limit for the entries to this contest has been extended to 11 a. m. Saturday. Rules for this contest are as follows:

Six eggs to the plate; child's name, age, and school to which they belong, plainly written on slip of paper placed in container for eggs.

All eggs taken to M. F. & H. store before 11 o'clock Saturday. Plates on which to display eggs will be furnished by this store.

Prizes

First—Easter basket containing candy eggs and Easter novelties.

Second—Chocolate Easter egg in basket.

Third—Live Easter bunny.

These prizes and many entries are now on display in the show window of the Medford Furniture & Hardware company. All exhibits for this contest will be utilized for the Easter egg hunt. The winners of these prizes will be announced at the park Saturday afternoon and prize winners will call at the store for prizes.

The attractive posters on display in the various show windows are the work of the younger children of the Medford public schools.

The high school band will play a number of selections during the afternoon. The children will be well cared for by a large committee of ladies. We want to make this a gala day for the children and for all who love children. TEXAS ENJOINED IN OIL DISPUTE

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Texas was enjoined today by the supreme court from issuing any permits affecting contested oil lands in the Red river valley pending a final decision on the boundary proceedings instituted by the state of Oklahoma.

The court also enjoined both states from removing any of the machinery now used in taking gas or oil from the land and ordered the appointment of Jacob M. Dickinson of Chicago, as receiver to take possession of the lands and property.
