# SMUGGERS READY BUT WEATHER MAN IS KIND THUS FAR

The smudging season is liable to open up any day now, and with the drop in temperature Wednesday the orchardists became somewhat worried for fear that a bad frost might come last night and scurried around lively getting the smudge pots ready for lighting.

But early last evening Floyd Young the government frost expert stationed here, made a temperature forecast of 34 degrees above and so notified the central telephone exchange, hence the orchardists were enabled to go to bed and sleep sound instead of sitting up all night and worrying. Mr. Young's forecast was well on the safe side as the official minimum temperature of the night and this morning was 35 degrees. The orchardists can learn from the telephone exchange early each evening, as in past years. Frost expert Young's forecast.

A killing frost now would do much harm. The clusters of the Anjou pear trees have opened out and the buds of the Howell and Bartlett pears are well advanced. Many peach, apricot and plum trees are in blossom throughout the valley.

The weather prediction for tonight and Friday is for probable rain. The precipitation of Wednesday and last night amounted to .62 of an inch.

### SOCIALISTS ARE OUSTED.

ably, as the sole judge of the qualifications of its members, had a right to expel any one and that its determination was final.

"As this power is subject to no external control," he said, "it is doubly necessary for us to exercise it only with self-control," he said, "because the greater the power, the more dangerous the abuse."

"To expel the socialist party from our assembly we must condemn it as a conspiracy. If we so expel it, we must in all logic, set about expelling all socialists from every office they hold throughout the length and breadth of this state and to bring the expulsion to its logical conclusion, as the right to vote in general entails the right to hold office, we must disenfranchise every dues-paying member of the socialist party."

"Against the party there has been urged as perhaps the two principal charges, disloyal action during the war and action or designs with the intent of overthrowing our present government by force."

"With regard to the first of these, the record shows that during the last crisis neither the party nor most of its members approved of the war, nor for that matter, of any war. They confined their activities, however, to protesting against the war and to refraining from giving voluntary help to its prosecution. To convict the party on the charge would therefore be to convict on a belief or a state of mind."

"With regard to the second charge, that of planning the overthrow of the government by force, in no part of the record do I consider this to have been proven. At worst there are some ambiguous phrases and utterances. To convict on these, it is necessary to assume that each and every member of the party subscribes to every tenet of the party, an unfair assumption."

"It has been definitely proved in the investigation that minors and aliens are members of the socialist party and may influence its policy and sit as members of its controlling committees. This is a most unsavory fact, but should we expel the party on this account? Again, no!"

"We abhor the party's principles. We must not let this influence us to commit a crime against representative government. We have established no case against the socialist party. We must not expel these men, there, simply because they are members of the socialist party."

"We have a rancorous dislike for the actions of most of these men as individuals. Our actions, however, must have no reference to any execution two things—original justice and discretionary application. We must not let this entirely justifiable dislike force us to commit a crime against representative government. We must re-seat these men and then in our pleasure take up and remedy by legislation such things in their party as may need correction."

He was active for years in Republican politics, and for a time served as assessor of Jackson county. Mr. Hamilton was a veteran member of Medford lodge No. 103, A. F. & A. M., also a charter member and one of the first trustees of the Medford lodge of Elks, No. 1168, B. P. O. E.

The deceased is survived by his widow, Enola Hamilton, two daughters who are Mrs. Venita Steffen and Mrs. Enid McCulloch of Seattle, and one son, Lorenzo D. Hamilton of Medford.

The funeral services will be held at the family residence on North Central ave., Saturday, April 3, at 2 p. m. Rev. L. Myron Boozer officiating. The Elks will have charge of the services at the house and the Masons at the grave.
