SUPPORT OREGON EDUCATION

EVERY business man knows that the expense of conducting business has increased tremendously the last few years. Therefore, every business man knows that the expense of conducting the educational institutions of the state has increased correspondingly.

In other words if the state institutions of learning are to be as good in the future as they have in the past, they must have more money. And if they are to have more money, the people of Oregon must give it to them.

It seems superfluous to dwell upon the practical value of these institutions. The value of O. A. C. is known to every farmer in southern Oregon, the university at Eugene is an institution of which every resident of the state is justly proud. The State Normal school produces teachers,—and the state's need for more and better teachers has never been greater than it is now.

To supply our essential educational industries with what they need and have earned, a tax of 1.26 mills will be voted on at the election May 21. This means a cost to the tax payer on a valuation of \$1,000 of \$1.26.

How could you spend \$1.26 to better advantage. It isn't as much as you would have to pay for a box of candy or a dozen poor cigars. Vote for this measure. It isn't a gift. It is merely back pay for services rendered.

BOOSTING AS THEY KNOCK

SENATOR GRONNA says the farmers of North Dakota will never forgive Hoover for a loss of \$2,000,000 in wheat. Perhaps not. But the people will. For the people know that a fixed price for wheat saved them \$100,000,000 and helped win the war.

Senator Reed declares the American people will never forgive Hoover for having a residence in London and sitting down to dinner with Lord Grey and the Duke of Meadowbrook,—or was it Buckingham? But the American people will. For they know that thanks to that residence in London, hundreds of stranded American citizens were allowed to get safely home, and they also know that as a result of that dinner, two or three million Belgian children were saved from starvation.

No, gentlemen, that sort of bunk won't work. You can fool some of the people some of the time, but you can't fool a majority of the people this time. The American people know pretty well what sort of a man Hoover is, what he stands for and what he did. They know what he promises now, and they know that he is short on words but powerful long on action. They know that Americanism is not a matter of latitude but of temper and the spirit of service.

The campaign is young yet. Several jugs of aqua pura will go over the dam before it is over. But here and now, we make this prediction. Before it is over Hoover will be grateful for his friends, but he will be only slightly less grateful for his enemies. For to the average person nothing boosts the Hoover stock higher, than the type of men who oppose him and the sort of things they say against him.

THE ONLY NEED

THE Hoover campaign needs no million dollar slush fund for propaganda purposes. It needs no spouting spell binders to whip an indifferent electorate into artificial enthusiasm. The Hoover record is known, the enthusiasm exists: all that is needed is to make this sentiment articulate. So it is up to every Hoover man and woman to make himself and herself known and felt. The machine politicians in control are not afraid to disregard Hoover, but they are afraid to disregard several million people. The job between now and convention time is for the Hoover supporters to gather from near and far, and show the high-ups just how they feel.
