NEW OFFICERS IN ELKS LODGE ARE INSTALLED

Concluding the most prosperous year in its history under the administration of George T. Collins as exalted ruler the Medford lodge of Elks last night with one of the largest attendances of the year installed its new officers, following which there was an enjoyable social session, features of which were two fast boxing bouts, the last of which was one of the best ever seen in the city, a general entertainment and the usual feed.

The new exalted ruler is O. O. Alenderfer, one of the veteran members of the lodge and one of its most active and untiring workers. Under the administration of Mr. Alenderfer and his fellow officers, both appointive and elective, the lodge looks forward to continued expansion and prosperity.

The installing officer last night was Leroy F. Buckingham, a past exalted ruler of the Salem lodge of Elks. The other new officers besides Mr. Alenderfer, are as follows: Esteemed leading knight, Rawles Moore; esteemed loyal knight, George Hilton, Jr.; esteemed lecturing knight, Frank P. Farrell; secretary, Lee L. Jacobs (re-elected); treasurer Vernon Vawter (re-elected); trustee three years term, Glenn O. Taylor; tiler, John H. Henselman; representative to grand lodge, Geo. T. Collins, alternate representative to grand lodge, J. J. Buchter.

Exalted Ruler Alenderfer appointed Floyd Hart as inner guard and happily all around re-appointed Jerry Jerome as esquire, Rev. Wm. B. Hamilton as chaplain, and H. G. Launspach organist. Edgar Wight was appointed assistant organist.

Another happy re-appointment was that of N. S. Bennett, whom the retiring exalted ruler in his address pronounced the "noblest Elk in the lodge," as chairman of the sick and relief committee. The finance committee for the year was appointed as follows: George A. Coddling, O. M. Selsby, and R. B. Hammond.

Splendid addresses were made by Geo. T. Collins and Mr. Alenderfer, the retiring and new exalted rulers, and brief remarks were made by each of the new officers. Then Gus Newberry on behalf of the lodge presented N. S. Bennett with the life membership card recently voted him by the lodge for his great services for years past in sick and relief work, and Mr. Bennett made a characteristically modest speech of acknowledgment.

Among the improvements during the year were the installation of shower baths and a well fitted gymnasium in the clubhouse, the purchase and installation of the lodge's extensive picnic and cutting grounds on Rogue river, the installation of a ventilation system in the big lodge room, and the recent purchase of the lot immediately adjoining the Elks temple on the north, on which the lodge will soon build an extension to the temple and club house building to house the restaurant and other club features.

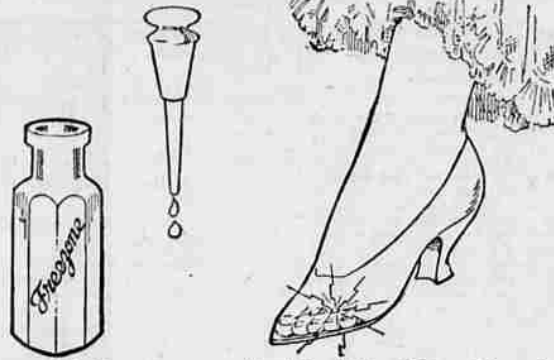
