

### HOOVER CLUB IS FORMED, ACTIVE CAMPAIGN STARTS

At an informal but enthusiastic luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon a Hoover Republican club was formed and the campaign for Hoover as the next president was formally opened. About 50 men and women from all parts of the county attended the meeting and over 50 signatures from the county were secured, although it is planned to secure several hundred before the petitions have to be sent in April 8.

Welborn Beeson of Ashland was elected president and Gain Robinson of Medford secretary. A county executive committee was formed as follows: Mrs. O. L. Davidson, Gain Robinson, Leonard Carpenter, R. It is planned to form Hoover clubs in every district of the county. Mr. Beeson made a short address. He declared the Hoover sentiment in Jackson county among the people to be tremendous, and predicted its steady growth. He urged every man and woman present to put their shoulders to the wheel and make Jackson county the banner Hoover county in the state.
