### FINAL CLEAN UP C. OF COMMERCE LAUNCHED TODAY

The Chamber of Commerce membership teams are again in the field today for the final clean up. It is expected that a substantial increase will be reported. Those who requested time to think it over, and those who were absent from town during the drive will be visited.

Pursuant to the organization meeting held last Friday night, when 45 of the membership met in the library and adopted a constitution and by-laws, the primary ballots were mailed Saturday. The manner of election provided in the by-laws contemplates a primary election and a final election, both by mail. A roster of the entire membership was mailed with the primary ballot, each member being requested to vote for fourteen, which is the number of directors to be elected. The 28 receiving the highest number of votes in the primary election will be the regular nominees on the final ballot. The primary election closes Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock and the final ballots will be mailed Thursday. The final election will close on Monday evening, April 12, at which time there will be held a smoker meeting in the headquarters.

#### Group Meetings

Membership group meetings will be held in the headquarters on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week at the hours of 10:30 a. m. and 2:00 p. m. and 4:00 p. m. Two meetings are set for each hour and will be conducted simultaneously. Every member has received a notice by mail to attend one of these meetings. Those finding it impossible to attend the meeting for which they are scheduled may attend a general clean-up meeting on Tuesday evening, at 8 o'clock in the headquarters.

The object of these group meetings is to solicit opinions and suggestions from the members, preparatory to the formulation of a program of work. There will be a different chairman for each meeting. (Continued from Page One) laid off when they reported for work today and others will follow as soon as the small receipts of animals on hand are disposed of. Only 3500 cattle, 5000 hogs and 500 sheep reached the stockyards today, as compared to receipts of 40,000 hogs alone a year ago.

An embargo on all express shipments was announced this morning by the American Railway Express company. Officials said the billiard yesterday, combined with the switchmen's strike had made it impossible to move cars in the local yards.

A. F. Whitney, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, which has branded the strike as "illegal," and in violation of the men's agreement with the roads, has taken personal charge of the efforts to break the walkout. Brotherhood men from other cities began arriving here this morning in response to Whitney's appeal for union "strike-breakers," and union officials hope to have enough men at work by night to keep essential business moving.

Chicago's milk supply was seriously threatened this morning but railroad officials said they would make every effort to keep milk trains running.

### CATTLEMEN VOTE TO JOIN UP WITH THE FARM BUREAU

The Dead Indian Cattlemen's association held their annual meeting at the Medford public library Saturday afternoon. The ordinary business for the season was transacted. Hugh B. Rankin of the Crater national forest addressed the cattlemen in reference to range conditions and range permits.

After the business meeting of the Dead Indian association, the meeting was turned over to Geo. A. Mansfield, president of the Farm Bureau, who extended an invitation to the members of the various cattlemen's associations of the county to join the Farm Bureau as individuals in order to carry on the live stock project, that has all ready been started in the Farm Bureau, to a successful finish. The motion was made and carried unanimously that all cattlemen affiliate themselves with the Farm Bureau and that representatives be selected from each stock association to confer with the county agent and officials of the Farm Bureau, to formulate plans to inaugurate the Australian auction system of selling cattle and other live stock. There were many cattlemen at this meeting who represented various sections of the county, and all were enthusiastic in regard to the rapid development of the Farm Bureau and its program of work.

#### FRENCH ADVANCE IN GERMANY

destined to force the German government to withdraw its troops from the Ruhr basin are now entirely in the hands of Marshal Foch, it was said at the foreign office today.

It is advanced in some well informed quarters that occupation of Frankfurt, Darmstadt, Homburg and Hanau is unlikely to exercise sufficient pressure upon the Germans, since they may well argue that this occupation is distasteful to the French as well as to themselves, and cannot continue indefinitely. On the other hand, the expense of the operation comes up as a vital question in the present state of French finances. The newspapers recall war tributes imposed by German troops upon French and Belgian cities and suggest similar measures being applied to German cities occupied by French troops.

Dispatches from Wiesbaden saying that General De Goutte's forces are under "alert" orders are explained as not necessarily meaning an immediate advance, but complete readiness to move forward unless Berlin promptly recalls the troops which have entered the Ruhr district against protests from France.

No censorship has been established here on news of the intended operation, but since the matter now is entirely in the hands of Marshal Foch, communications from the army probably will be surrounded with the usual precautions, altho the operation is not considered on a basis of war.

Germans Break Word The latest information reaching the foreign office confirms its belief that, despite the assurance officially given by the Germans that only a very limited number of troops had been sent to the Ruhr, in reality the number amounts to an army of forty thousand men.

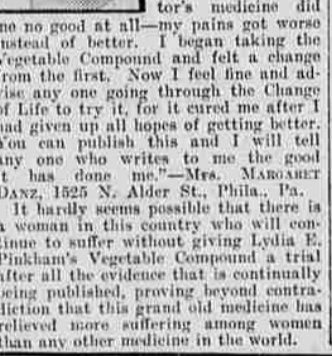
