**MRS. LARK EVANS HEARING EXTENDED FOR ANOTHER WEEK**

The preliminary hearing of Mrs. Lark Evans on the charge of the larceny of G. W. White's car in alleged connection with the sensational robbery of the Grants Pass jitney man, which was set for trial this forenoon in Judge Taylor's court, was continued until next Wednesday at 10 a. m. at the request of the defense because of inability of an important witness for the defense to be present today.

Gus Newbury is attorney for Mrs. Evans, who at her hearing two weeks ago on the charge of being an accomplice of her husband in the kidnaping and robbery of White, was discharged on a technical point of law raised by Porter J. Neff, who was acting as her attorney in place of Mr. Newbury who was engaged in circuit court at Jacksonville that day. It will be remembered that District Attorney Roberts then immediately caused her arrest on the charge of the larceny of White's car and when arraigned her hearing was set for today.

Lark Evans, who was convicted of the robbery of White over two weeks ago and was sentenced to 15 years in the state penitentiary by Judge Calkins, is still in the county jail as Mr. Newbury, his attorney, at once gave notice that Evans would seek a new trial and was given 30 days in which to file the formal application, which automatically stayed the carrying out of the sentence. It is understood that the defense has discovered much new and important evidence which will be disclosed when the motion for a new trial is argued.

**CUTTING FRAY IS AIRED IN COURT**

V. H. Norris, one of the drivers of the Interurban Auto line was arrested this noon by Sheriff Terrill, on the charge of assault to kill, the warrant for arrest having been issued on complaint of I. A. Snider of the Hines & Snider Auto company. It is alleged that during an altercation between the two men night before last Norris cut Mr. Snider on the left side with a knife. The hearing of Norris was set for late this afternoon before Judge Taylor.

**LATEST NEWS OF THE STATE**

**SALEM, Ore., April 9.**—Julius Wilbur, under arrest at Oakland, Cal. under an Oregon warrant, has made no application for executive clemency Governor Ben W. Olcott has told the district attorney at Oregon City. A report was said to have reached Oregon City, where Wilbur was convicted in 1916 of violation of the state prohibition act, that a petition in his behalf for pardon was pending.

**SALEM, Ore., April 9.**—Of \$26,397,327.96 in total revenues to the state highway department for the period from December 1, 1918, to the end of 1920, the state highway commission has paid or is under obligation to pay \$18,954,388.55.

This leaves from all sources a total of \$7,442,939.41 available for the remainder of this year, according to commission statistics made public here today.

**BAKER, Ore., April 9.**—Reports from the Long creek and Muddy creek districts near here are to the effect that a second winter is being experienced and hay is becoming so scarce that there is likely to be a severe loss of stock if the winter lasts much longer. Because of the snow, all farm work has been discontinued.

**SAN FRANCISCO, April 9.**—I. W. Hellman, president of the Wells Fargo Nevada National bank and one of the most prominent bankers in the state, died here today at the Adler sanitarium where his son, I. W. Hellman, Jr., president of the Union Trust company, is critically ill.

**ASTORIA, Ore., April 9.**—Falling thirty feet from a yardarm to the deck of a sailing vessel, Mike Boers, member of the crew of the ship St. Nicholas, which is loading here, sustained a broken wrist, broken right ankle and broken ribs. One of the broken ribs is said to have pierced a lung, causing hemorrhage. Physicians say he will live.

**BREAK IN LEVEE CREATES A LAKE 20 MILES LONG**

**MUSCATINE, Ia., April 9.**—The breaking of the Illinois levee a mile above the high bridge which spans the Mississippi river here had flooded 7,000 acres at ten o'clock this morning and the overflow of fully 40,000 additional acres lying below the district first affected cannot be averted. The flood will create a lake two miles wide and twenty miles in length.

The levee, weakened by waves which plunged against the barrier for days, collapsed without warning shortly before midnight. The several hundred families residing in the district lying behind the levee had moved out averting any loss of life. The loss to farmers and land owners will approximate a quarter of a million dollars.

**FOREIGN EXCHANGE STARTS UP AGAIN**

**NEW YORK, April 9.**—French and Italian exchange rates made new records today while marks, which have been improving steadily during the disturbed Franco-German situation were at the highest quotation of the week. Franc checks sold at 15.72 to the dollar, off 36 centimes, and lire sold at 24.62, off one lire thirty centimos. Marks were quoted at 1.73 cents but transactions have been few recently. Demand sterling was quoted at 3.98 3/4, a slight decline.

**NO PRIMARY CONTEST ON IN PENNSYLVANIA**

**HARRISBURG, Pa., April 9.**—There will be no contest on either the republican or democratic preferential ballot in Pennsylvania in the primary election May 18. The time for filing petitions expired at midnight last night and the records show that A. Mitchell Palmer's name will be the only one on the democratic ballot and that of Edward Randolph Wood, a retired business man of Philadelphia, will be the sole nomination on the republican ticket.

Mitchell, bishop of Minnesota, resident at St. Paul, are in the city to officially represent the board of bishops of the church and both will deliver addresses at the funeral.
