Mr. George Mansfield urged closer cooperation of the people of this locality, for that matter he gave as his opinion that this is an era of cooperation of all of the people of the United States for the higher ideals of the present day.

The newly elected directors were introduced and given assurances of hearty support after which refreshments, which were prepared by the ladies of the chamber, were enjoyed.
