The first run of the season will take place next Sunday, April 18. Riders at Ashland will start from that point at 9 a. m., and those from other points will join them as indicated by the following schedule:

Ashland, 9 a. m.; Medford, 9:45; Central Point, 10:00; Gold Hill, 10:30; Rogue River, 11:00; Grants Pass, 12:15 p. m.; lunch near Murphy, at 12:30. Leave Murphy, 2:00; leave Applegate, 2:45; leave Reeds, 3:15; leave Jacksonville, 4:00. Then home.

All motorcycle riders are invited to join and the time schedule has been so arranged that it is believed all can keep in the company with no great effort.

There are about one hundred motor cycles now running in the valley, and the season promises to be an enjoyable one, in view of the wonderful scenic opportunities and the great improvement in the roads. The first run is called a round-up, and is for the purpose of getting all the riders acquainted with each other, on an easy trial run.
