**LUMBERMAN SEES PROSPEROUS FUTURE SOUTHERN OREGON**

The forum luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce was held this noon at the Medford Hotel at which there were seventy members present. The general chairman of forum meetings, Mr. Ben C. Sheldon, presided and Claude C. Cate led the subject of the day which embraced the relationship of the Farm Bureau and its co-operative spirit to the business communities near which the same is located. A representative of the Oregon Taxpayer's League, Mr. F. I. Gollehur of Portland gave a short talk on present day problems. Dr. Parker of San Francisco gave his impressions of Medford upon this his first visit and predicted a bright future for the city.

An exceedingly interesting review of the past and also the future of the lumber industry was given by Mr. Arthur Morelev, president of the Saznaw Lumber Co., of Aberdeen, Washington. He gave his opinion that Southern Oregon with its immense amount of timber resources, would in the matter of a very short time, realize a prosperity far beyond that which may be realized by the residents. This was due to the fact that the lumbermen in the southern states, will have exhausted the supply there and because in the matter of less than ten years, lumber in the state of Washington will be gone and that necessity will bring the lumber men to Southern Oregon where the timber supply is unlimited and as yet untouched.

In addition to the above mentioned out of town guests were H. M. Grant of Portland and H. C. Galey of Ashland.

heads declared the insurgents gradually were losing strength.

Railroads in the Chicago area declared that 50 per cent of the switch engines in the district were operating largely with the help of more "loyal" brotherhood men from other cities. Railroad officials and newly employed men were aiding in moving freight.

**Government Is Active**

Government agents were taking a close check on the strike situation in various rail centers and at New Orleans, six insurgents leaders arrested last night in a raid on a strikers' meeting, were being held on federal warrants charging interference with the United States mails.

The American Federation of Labor through its railway department, which represents 700,000 members in eight railroad crafts, endorsed President Wilson's appointments to the labor board and declared its belief that labor could confidently expect justice through the law creating the board.

**100,000 Idle**

In Detroit 100,000 factory workers were reported idle and between 40,000 and 50,000 industrial workers in other parts of Michigan had been thrown out of work with predictions that more would be jobless by nightfall.

In Ohio more than 100,000 men were out of work in Columbus industries and virtually every coal mine in the state closed. Food supplies were reported scarce in many cities. A mail train was reported to have been abandoned at Youngstown and the mail returned to the postoffice.

Hope of ending the switchmen's strike at Columbus faded when road men voted not to act as strike-breakers.

Slight progress was made by strikers who went out at Cincinnati, the railroads announced.

The women vote down-state for Johnson was not counted separately. The figures from 5260 precincts out of 5690 in the state, including all 2448 in Cook county showed the following results:

Lowden—Men 190,480; women, 32,502; total, 222,982.

Wood—Men, 134,065; women, 23,743; total 158,408.

Johnson (Cook county) Men, 35,516; women, 5,385; (down state) men and women 4,312; total 45,193.

Of the district delegates elected to the national conventions all the democrats were uninstructed, while 35 of the republicans were pledged to Lowden and fifteen ran as unpledged. One of the unpledged delegates in the tenth (Cook county) had announced he would support Senator Johnson and the other fourteen were adherents of Mayor Thompson. The eight delegates at large will be selected at the state convention later.

**NEW RESOLUTION DECLARING PEACE OFFERED SENATE**

WASHINGTON, April 14.—A substitute for the republican joint peace resolution adopted last week by the house, was introduced today by Senator McCumber, of North Dakota, leader of the republican mild reservationists in the peace treaty fight. He announced that he would bring it before the special meeting of the foreign relations committee called for tomorrow to consider the house resolution.

Under the McCumber resolution commercial relations between the United States and Germany would be resumed to the same extent and under the same limitations as though no war had existed.

No resumption of diplomatic relations or settlement of war issues is proposed.

**SCHOOL TEACHERS TO SERVE AS FOREST LOOK-OUTS**

BELLINGHAM, Wash., April 14.—Two school teachers, Miss Corn Crosby, Bellingham and Miss Thompson, Everett, have been named to serve this summer at a lone fire lookout station on Sourdough mountain, north of here.

A lookout "cage" or cabin, located at an elevation of 7,000 feet will be occupied by the girls. Steel cables extending over the roof, anchor the cabin to the rocks so that winds will not hurl it down the mountainside.

**NEBRASKA HOOVERITES WON'T WRITE IN NAME**

OMAHA, Neb., April 14.—The Hoover republican club of Nebraska issued an appeal to the Nebraska voters that they not write Hoover's name on the ballots at the presidential preference primary April 20. This action, it was declared, is in accord with Mr. Hoover's wishes not to oppose "favorite sons," in their own states.
