Jackson county good roads adherents will be interested in the following item in the Eugene Register:

"The petition asking the Lane county court to call a special election May 21 for the purpose of submitting to the voters of the county the question of issuing \$2,000,000 bonds for the construction of roads was filed in the office of the county clerk yesterday. The petition contained 1650 names. According to the petition the bonds if voted are to run for a period of 25 years, bearing interest not to exceed five per cent per annum and to be redeemed one-twentieth annually at the end of the fifth year from the date of issue. The petition designates the roads in various parts of the county to be improved and states that not more than \$500,000 of the bonds are to be issued in a single year."

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WATERWAYS ONLY HOPE RESTORING U. S. RAIL SERVICE

ST. LOUIS, April 18.—Brigadier General P. T. Hines, chief of the transportation division of the war department which has control over inland waterways transportation in an address today before the convention of the Mississippi waterways association asserted the railroads welcomed the revival of water transportation as a "necessary ally in the solution of transportation problems."

"The demands which the railroads are being called upon to meet are greatly in excess of their combined facilities," he said. "There is an existing unappreciated demand for 500,000 freight cars alone. Railroad men have admitted that every locomotive plant in the country would have to work at capacity for three years to enable the railroads to even catch up with the actual demands now made upon them."

"It will thus be seen that the railroads are physically unable to meet the transportation demands of this new era. Of this work the waterways must perform important share."

U. S. Ship Captain Arrested. HAVANA, April 19.—Captain G. R. Visthem, of the United States shipping board steamer Lake Wilson, has been arrested and lodged in the municipal jail at Matanzas after a mutiny on the vessel. He is charged with using fire arms. Three members of the crew were seriously injured.
