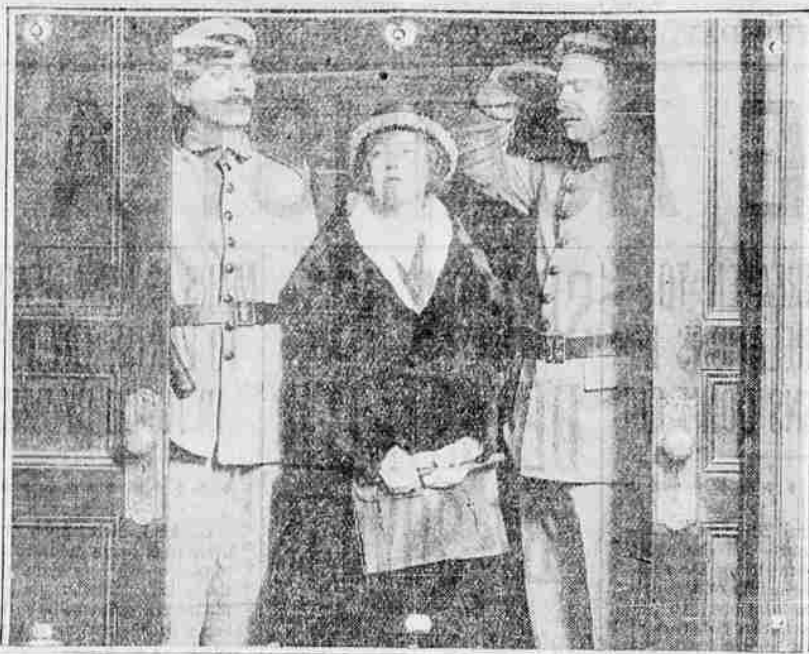

LEAGUE COVENANT TEST IN GEORGIA

ATLANTA, Ga., April 20.—Georgia democrats today were balloting in the state-wide presidential preference primary. Candidates for support of the state delegation at the San Francisco convention were Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer, generally described as the Wilson candidate, and an avowed proponent of the League of Nations as framed at Versailles, and Senator Hoke Smith and Thomas E. Watson. Senator Smith supported the republican reservations to the league covenant while Mr. Watson is opposed to the league in any form.
