The fact is so huge that they mean over 5000 boxes for every wholesale firm in the city, and it developed that at least half of those have only a few odd boxes on hand. Market for apples is extremely slow. Demand is dragging on every side and much stock is being offered at reduced values.

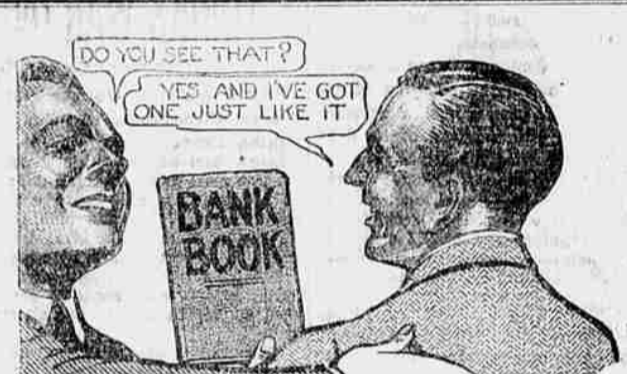
