PREST. CAMPBELL U. OF O. TALKS TO C. OF COMMERCE

PERJURY CHARGE AGAINST MRS. L. EVANS DISMISSED

In Justice Taylor's court Tuesday afternoon the perjury charge against Mrs. Lark Evans in connection with her having testified at her preliminary hearing last week on the charge of the larceny of the automobile of W. G. White of Grants Pass, was dismissed.

The dismissal came on a technical point raised by her attorney, Gus Newbury, that she had testified under a voluntary oath not authorized by law to be made by a defendant in a preliminary examination, when she testified that she had married Evans at Tacoma eight years ago under the name of Wallace Music.

The dismissal of the perjury charge has no bearing on the auto larceny charge on which she was bound over last week to the grand jury by Justice Taylor.

WHY THE HUNT FOR OIL HAS SPREAD OVER THE WORLD

The steady growth of industrial America is observed by all, but we need the help of census statistics to realize the rate of that growth. The power used in our manufacturing has about doubled in the past sixteen years; the kilowatt-hours turned out by our public utility stations have increased eight or nine fold in that same period.

And so the demand for lubricants becomes stronger on the road, on the farm, and in the mill. Still, while we think of this rapid development of power as using increased amounts of oil, it is equally true that oil saves power; so that if machinery multiplies manpower, lubricating oil is a good and faithful servant that deserves more than a passing thought.

With all these demands for fuel and lubricants, who can venture an estimate of our needs even ten years hence? Whence will the petroleum come to meet these needs? The river of oil representing our 1918 consumption drew from the ground more than one-twentieth of the quantity estimated by the United States geological survey geologists as the content of our unrecovered underground reserve, and it also took nearly one-fifth of the oil stored above the ground.

The estimate of about 6 1/2 billion barrels as now available is far less impressive when we realize how fast we are using it up and that while we have burned and wasted less than one per cent of the coal resources of the United States in the last 100 years we have apparently used up 40 per cent of our available oil supply in only 60 years.

This is why the hunt for oil has become world-wide and suggests a compelling reason for Americans to lead in that hunt.

AMERICAN SHIP SINKING AT SEA

LONDON, April 21.—A report to the Lloyd Shipping agency today says the American steamer Wayhat is sinking in latitude 47 degrees north, longitude seven degrees west. A tug is on the way to the assistance of the distressed vessel.

NEW YORK, April 21.—The steamer Wayhat is a wooden vessel of 2551 tons gross owned by the shipping board and under operation of the Mallory line in trade between Belgium, France and Gibraltar. She carries a crew of about thirty men and was built in 1918.

The last report received here of the steamer was when she left Huelva, April 17 for Antwerp with a cargo of ore.

HAWLEY LAND BILL IS FAVORABLY REPORTED

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The house public lands committee voted today to report a bill introduced by Representative Hawley, republican, Oregon, which would permit the sale of isolated tracts in the former Oregon-California land grant. Under the provisions of the bill these tracts would be opened for homestead entry for two years prior to their sale.

SALEM, Ore., April 20.—The state supreme court in affirming today a decree of Judge George R. Bagley of Tillamook county, in the case of the State vs. Vern Blanchard, appellant, upholds as to their validity practically all fish and game laws of the state, settles for all time, it is thought, the question whether the legislature can protect the fish in any certain stream or the game in any certain locality.

CARRANZA LOSING HOLD IN MEXICO IS LATEST REPORT

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Official and unofficial reports received here today from Mexico told of further defections from the ranks of Carranza adherents. Advice to the state department said that General Fortunato Maycut had joined the Obregonistas with his entire command, which has been operating in the border country between the states of Morelos, Michoacan and Guerrero, a short distance west of Mexico City.

Obregon, General Benjamin Hill and a number of friendly officials who recently fled from Mexico City are with Maycut's command, which consists of three regiments of cavalry, and two of artillery.

Private advices from the border said that General Arnulfo Gomez with 3000 men had occupied Tuxcan and was threatening Tampico. These advices also declared that Colonel Rodolfo Gallegos and 400 men in Linares, Nuevo Leon, had declared in favor of Sotera as had Generals Ambrosio Gomez and Amaro Durango in Chihuahua.

Advices from the same sources also said that Governors Nicolas Flores, of Hidalgo and Maximo Rojas, of Tlaxcala, backed by the legislatures, and state troops also had declared in favor of Sotera.

Reports at the state department said a group of fifteen deputies has left Mexico City for Sonora by way of Laredo. It was supposed they were among the forty-eight who recently issued a manifesto charging Carranza with having precipitated the present situation by his arbitrary civil and military acts against the various states of the republic.

Officials here have noted that the censorship is being rigidly enforced in Mexico City. Copies of Mexico City newspapers received yesterday and today contained many blank columns, especially on the editorial pages.

CANADIAN DOCTOR IS MURDERED IN CHINA

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 21.—A serious situation has been created in Honan, China, as a result of the murder by bandits of Dr. James Menzies according to information received by the Vancouver World. Chao Tih, the military governor of Honan, has been severely censured by the Pekin authorities for his inability to protect the lives and property of foreigners, the dispatch stated.

Dr. Menzies came from Toronto, where his widow now resides, and for more than 20 years was a missionary in China. He expired shortly after being wounded while defending women missionaries from attacks by robbers, the dispatch added.

MUSTY—Died at her home at Central Point, Ore., April 20, after a lingering illness from dropsy, Elmin Ann Musty, who was born in Miami county, Indiana, June 3, 1850, where she lived until January, 1869 when she moved with her father's family to Neosha county, Kansas. In February, 1870, she was married to Francis X. Musty, and soon after went on their honeymoon by ox team onto their homestead in Butler county, Kansas, where they endured and enjoyed many of the hardships and pleasures incident to life on what was then the frontier, fifty years ago. In 1881 she crossed the plains by wagon train with her family to what is now Wallawa county, Oregon, where she gained the respect and good will of every one, later coming to Jackson county, where she has lived the past ten years.

She was the mother of ten children, and is survived by her husband, Francis X., four sons and two daughters, who are Nicholas Musty of Imbaha, Ore.; William Musty, of Free-water, Ore.; Albert and Edward Musty of Central Point, Ore.; Mrs. Assenath Simmons of Joseph, Ore. and Mrs. Effie Casebolt of Medford, Ore.

Funeral services will be held at the residence Thursday at 10:30 a. m. Interment in the Antioch cemetery.

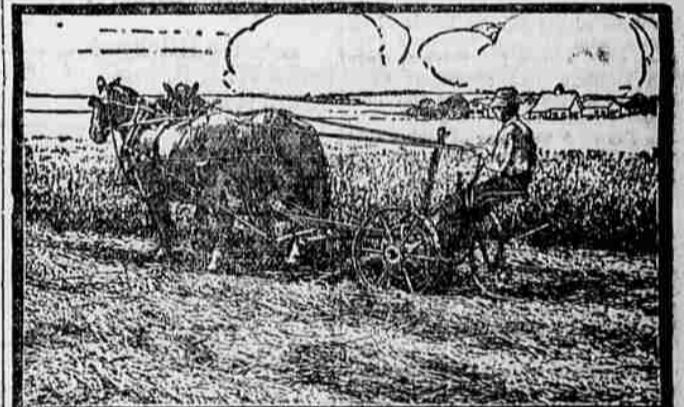
