KANSAS FARMERS CLAIM 43 CENT LOSS ON WHEAT

TOPEKA, Kas., April 21.—Kansas wheat growers raised their 1919 wheat crop at an average loss of 43 cents an acre, J. C. Mohler, secretary of the state board of agriculture announced today in a report compiled from questionnaires returned by 2,040 farmers on 491,062 acres. The only gain was in the western division where there was an average profit of \$1.89 an acre.

M EAGRE returns from Nebraska indicate the expected. After the Michigan landslide for Johnson, political observers generally conceded the state to the California senator. In addition to an even stronger pro-German element than there is in Michigan, Nebraska is largely a farming state, and Johnson's campaign against Wood, on the ground of militarism and excessive expenditures, was certain to find a fertile field. As the returns from the country districts come in, the Johnson lead will undoubtedly be increased, and it is probable Pershing will gain of his military rival, under the force of the favorite son sentiment.

In the Oregonian the other day, Mark Sullivan, former editor of Colliers, a personal friend of General Wood, and a discerning political observer, admitted the general's stock had reached the peak, and was visibly declining. He compared the general's chances of securing the republican nomination to the chances of the Germans capturing Paris. It had to be done quickly, if it were to be done at all. He concluded that if General Wood failed to secure the nomination on the first ballot,—and he didn't believe he would have half the required number,—his chances would be over. He looked for a realignment behind a compromise candidate.

That is now a very general impression. The politicians who, of course, will control the convention, are now preparing for just such a contingency, and are quietly organizing a machine made landslide for Senator Harding of Ohio. Harding is a conventional, safe and sane product of the Mark Hanna school, with nothing much against him, and nothing for him. The wise ones figure he would make a model President, wisely neglecting to repeat that a model is a small imitation of the real thing.

It is all decidedly amusing,—if one has the disposition in these disturbing times, to laugh. Not only is the old, old game being revived again, but it is being played in the old, old way. The general war reaction, supplemented by far-reaching aversion to the present administration is being depended upon to carry the republican party into power, regardless of the nominee as long as he is sufficiently negative. Naturally, the politicians prefer a man who will play their game to a man who won't.

But the wise ones,—the political veterans of the perennial battle of bunk,—have been mistaken before and there is a chance they will find themselves mistaken again. At any rate a great deal may happen between now and the time the curtain goes up on the carefully rehearsed performance in June.

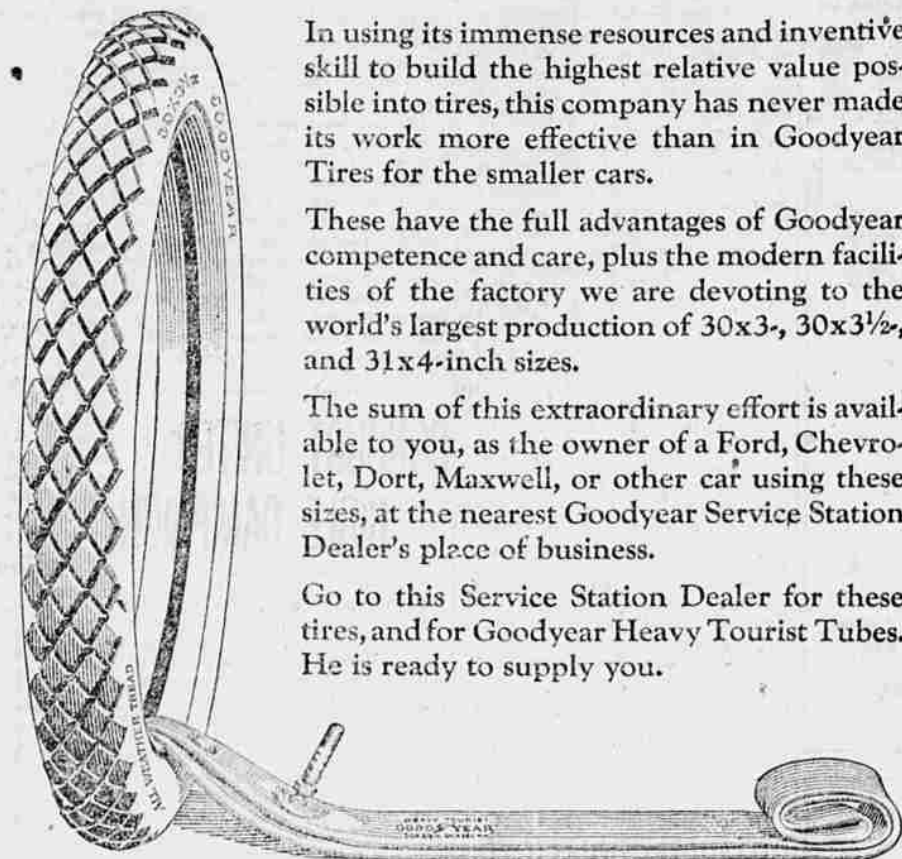
