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NAME COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE R. R. FISH PROBLEM

"The opinion of the attorney general in regard to the Rogue river fish controversy, has created an impression among many interested parties throughout the state of Oregon, that the agreement is invalid, and that the effort made by the parties in interest to adjust the differences has been destroyed," said Senator C. M. Thomas today.

"I have received many letters and telegrams asking what effect the attorney general's opinion would have, and suggesting the fear that the compact was at an end. Such conclusion is entirely erroneous, and the attorney general's opinion, of which I am advised only by associated press reports, merely affects the authority of the fish and game commission of the state for this season to aid in carrying out portions of the agreement.

"What Compact States

"The compact states that the parties have agreed definitely on certain things, among which include the fact that the use of all seines and set nets, divers nets and trammel nets, shall be prohibited; that commercial fishing shall be limited to the use of drift nets, having a mesh of not less than eight and one-half inches; the period at which the commercial season shall end is fixed; as well as the territory in which commercial fishing may be allowed; the parties agree to co-operate to perfect screening of all irrigation ditches; to co-operate to secure the removal of the present obstruction of the passage way of fish at Ament Dam; to co-operate in the hatchery work at Elk creek in the upper river, as well as other matters. Then follows a recitation of how these matters are to be made operative.

"Appoint a Committee

"The agreement provides that a committee shall be formed. Each signer (not endorser) of the contract shall select one of its members to act on this general committee, having as its duty the investigation of the unsettled portions, or items, of the agreement, and of matters not mentioned therein. This committee is bound to make a thoro investigation, report to its organization and before the next session of the legislature a general meeting to be held with the commercial fishing interests for the purpose of discussion and investigation with the commercial interests of a proposed bill to be presented to the next session of the legislature, and to include all of the matters definitely settled at this time by the agreement, together with others that have been left open for investigation and further discussion.

"At the time the agreement was drafted, it was first determined not to present the agreement to the state fish and game commission at this time, but to wait until the fall meeting. However, there were parties present who believed that the fish and game commission had power under present game laws to change the opening and closing of fishing seasons, as well as other powers, and could be of some little service at this time in aiding the interested parties, and for this reason the following clause was inserted in the agreement, to-wit: "It is agreed, that a copy of this agreement shall be forwarded and filed with the state fish and game commission, with the request that the provisions herein be at once put in force and effect pending legislative enactment."

"If the press reports are true, the attorney general has ruled that the fish and game commission has no authority at this time to aid in the working out of the Rogue river controversy, which ruling aids all of the interested parties locally, as many have contended that the commission had full power and authority.

"Committee Representative

"The respective signers are now completing the committee provided for under the agreement. This will soon be accomplished, and will include all interested parties of the Rogue river. This committee will then take up the investigation of those questions that are not settled by the agreement, and fully advise themselves for a final hearing with the commercial interests in the fall. In the meantime, altho the state fish and game commission appears to be powerless in the matter and unable to aid the parties in interest, still the committee undoubtedly will be pleased to cooperate with the state, as well as the federal authorities in the matter of investigation and acquiring data to the end that the best possible bill may finally be presented.

"Instead of being an injury to the situation, the attorney general's opinion makes it clear that the method being pursued under the agreement is the only proper way to handle the situation."

MAY INCORPORATE AIRPLANE FIELD IN FAIR GROUNDS

The installation service conducted by Mr. R. B. Leopold with the American City Bureau for the local Chamber of Commerce terminated with the submission and adoption of a program of work. This program contemplates definite activities to which the organization will devote its energies, and also provides specific procedure for their enactment.

The big factor in Chamber of Commerce failures is invariably lack of a definite working program and lack of sufficient knowledge of procedure.

Mr. Leopold, who is a veteran in commercial organization, having been engaged seven years in commercial organizing and secretarial work, expressed his entire satisfaction with the program as suggested by the members, and predicted a very successful era for the local chamber.

To the board of directors, Medford Chamber of Commerce, Medford, Ore.

I have the honor to transmit to you herewith the program of work which the membership have, by their collective opinion, signified a desire for the organization to undertake, and together with it, some suggestions and references which I believe will be helpful in its accomplishment.

Community Spirit

The impressive fact emanating from the group meetings and forum discussions has been the necessity and opportunity for creating a strong community spirit for Medford and the community surrounding. Leadership in its creation is the one factor needed. The foundations have already been built; the democracy among all citizens, the spirit of team work in civic affairs, the common interest manifested in public gatherings, together with the wonderful agricultural and natural resource possibilities of the immediate vicinity, all form the basis for community spirit. The Chamber of Commerce should lead in amalgamating and utilizing all forces in upbuilding a lively loyalty for the community.

Need of Fair Grounds

The foremost plank in the program of work is composite in nature and will require most careful thought, before a definite project along this line is undertaken. The need for a fair grounds was one of the first suggestions growing out of the group meetings, and, with continued discussion, the idea was enlarged and elaborated upon so as to include many other features. I would caution you to carefully consider the feasibility of incorporating recreational features and the auto camp into the fair grounds and aviation field.

As committees are appointed to take up the subjects in the major working program, the suggestions of the members, contained in the card record of the program of work, should be placed at their disposal.

The great variety of suggestions under each main subject will be particularly helpful, and will suggest to the committee sources from which further information may be obtained.

Concentration Needed

It will be best for the board to be aggressive along a few lines rather than spread its efforts over too many undertakings. This idea was carefully adhered to in determining the number and character of projects for the major program. The board should, however, be careful to keep the committee machinery up to the highest capacity possible even including subjects now listed under the supplementary program which can be worked into the active working program.

While the energies of the directors should be kept, as far as possible, for their primary duties as directors, in case committees need special support a board member should be appointed to work on them.

The forum program is unusually well supplied with discussonal subjects. As the clearing house of public opinion of the whole membership, and the school house for educating the members on the subjects which

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eventually come before the organization for direct action, the forum is certain to be one of the most important parts of the chamber's machinery.

I have been impressed with the ability of the various members to express their thoughts in public, and I feel confident that frequent meetings of the members forum will answer the question: "What is the Chamber of Commerce doing?" and also serve as a feeder to the major working program.

With regard to any bureaus which might be formed within the organization, may I suggest that the best judgment of modern Chambers of Commerce is that members should pay for special service which is of direct monetary benefit to them. Where the bureau serves the entire membership or community, support may well be granted to it by the organization.

With the enlarged scope and membership which now exists, it is important that the secretary be provided with sufficient clerical help, in order that he may carry out his function as an executive.

I am sure I am expressing the pleasure of all the members of the American City Bureau staff who have had the good fortune to be associated with you in cooperation in the work which has given Medford a strong, substantial civic commercial organization. The active presence of so many public-minded women, both in the campaign and on the membership, and the support given by those interested in agriculture, is a further indication that the chamber is looked upon as the organization which will influence and direct all classes and forces in the community.

DOUGHNUTS and CRULLERS

DOUGHNUTS made during the war and no wonder. There is nothing more wholesome and delightful than doughnuts or crullers rightly made. Their rich, golden color and appetizing aroma will create an appetite quicker than anything else in the world.

Here are the famous doughnut and cruller recipes from the New Royal Cook Book.

Doughnuts
2 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
3 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; stir in milk; add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder which have been sifted together and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick; cut out. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 60 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Afternoon Tea Doughnuts
2 eggs
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg

4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beaten eggs; sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick and cut into strips about 4 inches long and 1/4 inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.
