MONTEVIDEO PREST. ENDORSES WILSON'S AMERICAN LEAGUE

MONTEVIDEO, April 21.—Formation of an "American league" on a basis of absolute equality between American nations for common action against aggression threatening any one of them from outside nations and for arbitration of inter-American disputes, was proposed by Dr. Baltasar Bruin, president of Uruguay, in addressing students of the University of Montevideo tonight.

Dr. Bruin declared other American countries should make a declaration similar to the Monroe doctrine, to obtain the solidarity of the American continent. He said should any member of the "American league" have a controversy with the League of Nations, that nation should ask for the co-operation of the "American League," in settling the controversy.

Taking up the Monroe doctrine, Dr. Bruin pointed out how it had "constituted, on the whole, an efficacious safeguard to the territorial integrity of many American countries."

Dr. Bruin asserted the entry of the United States into the war was "an anticipated application of the Monroe doctrine," adding:

"Owing to the state in which European countries remain after the struggle, it may be said that fear of invasion by them in America has been removed for many years."

"But is that sufficient reason for us to take no interest in the future, and turn away from the Monroe doctrine with the pretext it is now unnecessary?" he asked. "I believe that today, more than ever, we should use foresight in searching for formulas that may assure forever the peace and full independence of American countries."

Referring to his scheme for an "American league," as the same as President Wilson proposed organizing, Dr. Bruin thought it could co-exist with the League of Nations without difficulty.

He pointed out that unsettled boundary questions were still embarrassing many American countries and said settlement would be possible by the "American league," without appeal to the League of Nations. Regarding the internal questions of individual nations, he thought no intervention should be permitted unless two-thirds of the allied countries decided to intervene.

President Bruin expressed belief that the American political world should also declare against diplomatic interference by outside nations.

SENATOR CUMMINS DECLARES TREATY WILL BE AN ISSUE

DES MOINES, Ia., April 22.—President Wilson and the peace treaty were condemned and the railroad law commended by Senator Cummins, president pro tempore of the senate, in an address here today to the Iowa republican convention.

Predicting republican success next November Senator Cummins said a republican president should be chosen "because it is high time that the president should be a right minded man."

"For surely," he continued, "eight years of mystery, of uncertainty, of inconsistency, of abnormality, of inconceivable twisting and turning in the office of the chief executive are punishment enough for all the sins and blunders we may have committed and we have earned our emancipation."

Senator Cummins characterized the law returning the railroads to private ownership as "a great forward step in progressive and constructive legislation," containing "a code for protection of railroad workers."

Reiterating advocacy of anti-strike legislation, Mr. Cummins said the railroad labor board is "a tribunal which will render the railroad wage workers a surer and higher justice than they can ever hope to secure through a strike."

The treaty of Versailles will be a campaign issue, said Mr. Cummins, who asserted that it contained "unconstitutional and treasonable provisions."

The greatest problem now facing America, Mr. Cummins said, is "to readjust the disordered relation which has inevitably appeared between wages and compensation for personal service and the price of commodities." Increased production, he added, was the remedy.
