CURTIS AIRPLANE HERE, WILL GIVE DAILY FLIGHTS

The impromptu dedication of Medford's new and extensive aviation field, known as Gore landing field and which was donated to the chamber of commerce for this purpose, is taking place this afternoon, because of the unannounced arrival here this morning of a commercial airplane, which will give flights from this field daily until Sunday and may be here that day. Water has been installed at the field and a telephone will be set up tomorrow.

By Superintendent Davenport's order the high and grade schools were adjourned this noon for the day in order to allow the pupils to witness the flights.

The airplane, which arrived here this morning from Etna Mills, Calif., is the three-passenger Curtis 4, "The Hawk," owned by the Thompson Aircraft company of San Francisco, which has been in the commercial passenger carrying flight business for over a year past, during which about 9000 passengers were taken up without a mishap. The prettiest girl present daily will be given a free flight, and the first five passengers going up will be the beauty judges.

The men to arrive in the plane today were T. A. Jenkins, and Roland S. and C. R. Thompson. They made the flight here from Scott Valley in 1 hour and 3 minutes, coming over the Siskiyou at an elevation of 9000 feet.

TOLL OF SOUTHERN TORNADO 233 DEAD AND 610 INJURED

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 23.—Reports received directly from the portions of Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee swept by Tuesday's tornadoes today brought the death list up to 233. Previous reports had estimated the dead at 155.

Today's reports from the three states showed:

Mississippi, 150 dead, 100 injured. Alabama, 78 dead, 500 injured. Tennessee 5 dead, 10 injured.

Families made homeless were estimated at nearly 500 and losses in livestock and property were placed at \$2,000,000.

LATEST NEWS OF THE STATE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23.—Three full cargoes of wheat or flour were booked yesterday by the Columbia-Pacific Shipping company for export from Portland to Europe during May and June, will be steamers Dewey, Effingham and Eskersfield of the European-Pacific line.

BAKER, Ore., April 23.—Members of the fire department have presented to the city commissioners a demand for an increase in salaries of \$20 a month to take effect May 1. Most of the members of the local fire department now receive \$105 a month and the highest salaried fireman receives \$115.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23.—Disposition of the cases of two alleged members of the communist labor party out on bail here on order of Assistant Secretary of Labor Post was expected to result from a meeting being held in Washington today, according to information received today by District Attorney Walter H. Evans. The two concerned are Victor and Julius Sault, unnaturalized Russians. Their bail was recently ordered reduced from \$10,000 each to \$1,000 each by Assistant Secretary Post.

SALEM, Ore., April 23.—Because of the low figure offered, the state board of control today refused to accept the bid of a Portland bonding firm for \$1,000,000 of state highway bonds and will re-advertise the issue, bids to be opened May 11.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23.—Although the state has lavished money on institutions for defectives it has failed to provide rightly for the boys placed in the reform school, many of whom can be made into good citizens, according to Bruce Shumway, director of the extension gymnasium work at Reed university here, who has just returned from an inspection of state institutions at Salem. Mr. Shumway says that the verdict of himself and a party of students of sociology of Reed favored the "scrapping" of the state training school for boys.

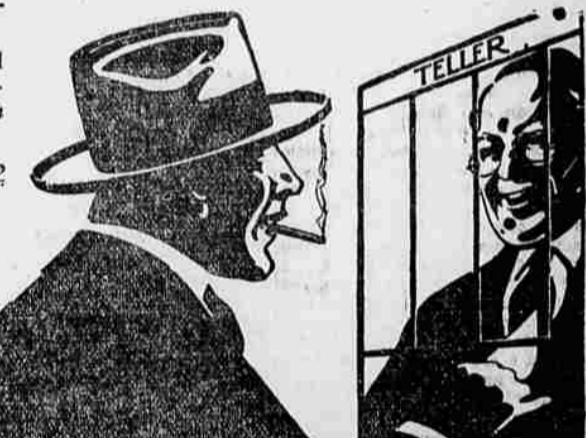
