CHURCH MORTGAGE WILL BE BURNED SUNDAY SERVICE

The annual meeting of the congregation of the First Presbyterian church held last evening in the chapel of the church was a very happy occasion for the large company present. As the reports of the various societies of the church were read it was evident that notable progress was being made in the organized life of the church. The session reported a substantial increase in the membership and a general tone much in advance. The outlook for steady growth is bright.

The trustees added greatly to the happiness of the hour when they presented the congregation with a cancelled mortgage for \$2500 that had been hanging over the church for eight years. They reported a decrease in debts the past eighteen months of nearly \$5000 leaving the church with a debt of less than a thousand dollars which will be gradually reduced during this year. They recommended a raise of \$500 in the salary of the minister which was voted with manifest enthusiasm.

The Woman's Missionary society, Woman's association, Sunday school and young ladies' guild all gave reports of good work accomplished that represented earnest and successful effort. The opening of the Presbyterian club house for young people was a notable achievement of the year. Added equipment will make this building on the corner of Holly and Ninth streets, the center of helpful activities.

Mrs. Frank Isaac, treasurer.

A committee was appointed to burn the old mortgage during the morning service next Sunday. Mrs. Frank Isaac was selected to apply the match to the document.

IMPROVE MACHINERY FOR DISTRIBUTION IS HOOVER'S SUGGESTION

Relative to the control of marketing, Mr. Hoover declared:

"We have too many people engaged in distribution of food supplies. This is particularly true in the retail business. The numbers engaged in distribution have, naturally, increased rapidly during the war inflation and speculation. In such periods much profit is earned by the simple process of making up the price of goods on the shelf to the cost of replacements."

Mr. Hoover declared in favor of co-operative marketing and said that as it "does not reduce initiative or competition, I have never seen the boggy of socialism in it."

He urged an exhaustive and practical investigation of the great boards of trade, with a view to extending their legitimate functions or preventing their abuse.

"We want to improve our machinery of production and distribution," he said, "but do not want to tear it down nor do we want it owned or run for the benefit of a few. It will never function on the basis of altruism. If we would have it function properly we must promote that equality of opportunity which allows every member of this community to attain that position to which his abilities and character entitle him." — Oregon Grower.

MEDFORD I. O. O. F. BUYS PROPERTY AT GRAPE AND SIXTH

For the present, no changes will be made in the building now on the premises.

The subordinate and Rebekah branches especially have made very substantial gains in membership during the past six months, and are now engaged in a good-natured rivalry to see which shall first reach the two hundred mark.
