The initial 1920 issue of the U. S. forest service fishing bulletin made its appearance last Thursday and will be published by that department during the angling season, covering the Pacific coast. Items of interest to local fishermen are the first reports of the forest service field men regarding the following: Rogue river—Good catches of trout are being made at all points along the river between Grants Pass and mouth of Mule creek. At present water is muddy and fishing is mainly by bait. Reached by way of Merfin, Or., along Grants Pass-Alameda automobile road. Squaw lake—Good catches of rainbow trout—frequently limit catches—are being made here. Reached via Medford, the travel being by automobile for 27 miles and by pack trail for five miles. Other lakes are not accessible at present and creeks and rivers too high and muddy to be fished.

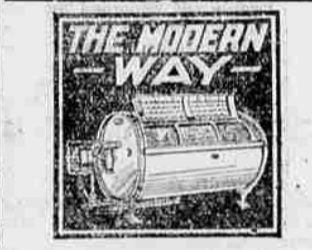
