ASHLAND DRIVE AWAY OVER TOP WITH 473 TOTAL

ASHLAND, April 24.—Over the top, to the extent of 73 more than the quota of 400 members, were the returns forthcoming at the close of the canvass, on Friday afternoon in behalf of the Commercial Club as reorganized. The result is that an effort will be made to place the membership in the 500 classification, if not exceeding that number. Next Wednesday, April 28, is the date set for securing this maximum, although the 473 figures are gradually being increased by voluntary additions to the "roll of honor." By division reckoning, Major Briggs and his cohorts came out ahead in the recruitment drive, having secured 210 members, as compared to the 182 secured by Major McNair's command. In teamwork Captain Fred Engle led with 32 recruits, Mrs. Captain Elmore ranking second in the list with 47, Captain Enders third with 43, and Captain Billings fourth with 42. The total number added to the membership list on Friday was 153.

The community budget was reinforced on Friday to the extent of \$935, making the total pledges toward this fund \$3,038, a sum which it is hoped will expand to the proportions of \$6,000 when the returns, both actual and prospective, are all in.
