MEDFORD MASONS DECIDE TO BUY ST. MARKS BLDG.

The Medford lodge, F. and A. M., has decided to purchase the St. Mark's building at the corner of West Main and North Grape streets, which was related recently as a possibility in this newspaper, and to this end the trustees of the lodge have issued 20 year bonds to the sum of \$30,000 in denominations of \$50, \$100 and \$500, drawing 6 per cent interest and payable annually.

These bonds are now offered for sale not only to the Masonic fraternity but to the general public. There are a number of Masons in Medford and vicinity who are not members of Medford lodge and they are invited to join with the members in purchasing these building bonds. The issue must be sold within the next 30 days, as the 90 days option, which the lodge obtained on the building some time ago, expires at that time.

Ralph Woodford is the general chairman in charge of the affair, and in addition Dr. E. G. Riddell, Geo. L. Treichler and J. A. Perry have subscription lists in charge.

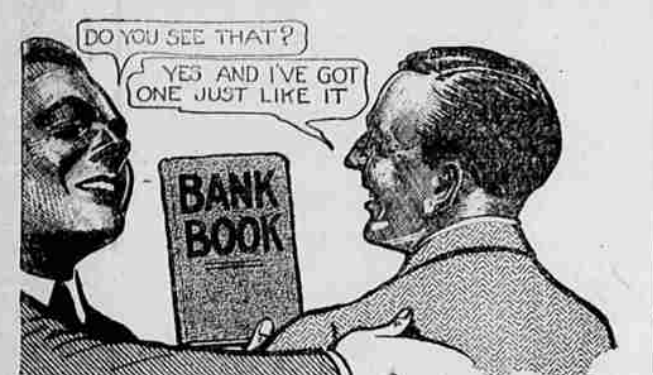

Harriet Leichester, a young society girl, was represented by Evelyn Dew. Her acting and stage appearance was excellent.

The humorous touches were, to a great measure, brought out thru the work of Marvin Lucas, who played the part of Mulberry, an old broken down literary man, and Edward Kelly who represented the flunky. Every member of the senior cast deserves hearty commendation for his or her acting.

Before the curtain went up and between acts the Medford high school orchestra played several good musical numbers. The work of this organization topped off the evening's entertainment and contributed materially to its success. The senior class wish to extend to the people of Medford their appreciation for the generous contributions of furniture for scenery and their loyal support at the performance last night. 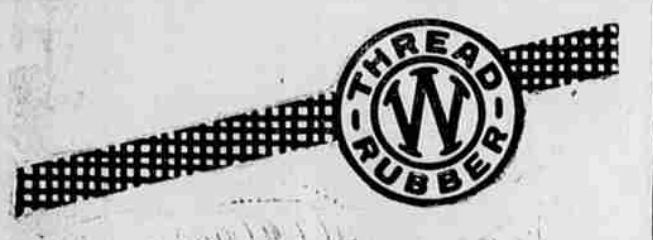

SILENT PRAYER TO OPEN INTERCHURCH CAMPAIGN SUNDAY

Silent prayer by millions is the opening feature of the united simultaneous campaign by the thirty denominations cooperating in the Interchurch World movement, which is to start Sunday at 2 p. m. At that hour all members of the participating denominations and friendly citizens who are in sympathy with the cause of American Protestantism are asked to pause in whatever they are doing and indulge in five minutes of silent prayer for the success of the great campaign being entered upon. The active work will start from the Presbyterian church as a base, and all captains and team workers are asked to assemble there at the hour named to engage in a short period of reverential contact with the divine head of the church. This announcement was made by Walter Frazer Brown, united campaign director for Jackson county.

Of the total sum of \$336,777,572 which is the goal of the drive, the quota allocated to this county is \$5700. Campaign Director Brown is confident that the sum will be raised among the churches participating in the drive here, aided by gifts from friendly citizens who will be canvassed by the interdenominational teams already appointed.

Thruout the week, April 25 to May 2, daily reports of the progress made towards the desired quota will be announced in the Mail Tribune. It is hoped that a union service of the churches can be arranged for Sunday evening, May 2, at which something like a definite grand total for the county can be announced. Later notice will be given.

The objects for which the funds are being collected are the missionary and benevolent enterprises of the churches, including home and foreign missions, education, hospitals and homes, and ministerial pensions and relief.

governor of Guerrero, had revolted, but that the federal forces of that state under General Maycote had remained loyal.

General Maycote was recently reported to have joined the rebels.

General Itarbe, commander of the federal forces at Maratlan on the Pacific coast, was reported to have ordered the iron bridge over the San Lorenzo river destroyed as a measure of defensive precaution. General Angel Flores, commander of Sonora rebels pushing south through Simla broke through the federal line at the San Lorenzo river April 22, the advances stated. General Flores claims that order is being maintained in the territory under his control.

General Pablo Gonzalez is believed to be remaining loyal to Carranza.
