

ROAD MEDFORD TO REDDING NOW IN FINE SHAPE

The road south from Medford to Redding, Calif., is fine for touring with the exception of five miles of soft but easily passable highway between Ashland and the summit of the Siskiyou, but from there on to Redding is smooth as glass, Carl Tengwald reported last night on arriving home from Redding, to which city he drove the auto of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Westerlund, who are enroute south, on Tuesday.

They left Medford at the same time as the forenoon southbound passenger train and reached Redding, 171 miles, leisurely driving, 2 1/2 hours before the train arrived there. They passed only about a dozen cars of northbound tourists but Mr. Tengwald heard at Redding that there are many auto tourists waiting at Oakland and Sacramento to come this way as soon as they receive reports that Smith hill, low Creek canyon, and the rest of the Pacific highway in Oregon is in good traveling shape.

It will be pleasing news to the people of Medford who plan auto trips north, as well as the tourists, that the road over Smith hill is now in fairly good shape. Regarding this the Grants Pass Courier says: "The road over Smith hill is said to be in good condition. William Light, who lives at the foot of the hill, is in the city today and gave out the information that cars could get over the grade easily. It is a trifle rough yet, but the roads are dry. Tourists coming thru say that they have not found any mud on the hills."

EUROPEAN PLAN UNDER MANAGEMENT W.B. JAMES

FRENCH RAILROAD WORKERS PLAN A GENERAL WALKOUT

PARIS, April 29.—The general federation of labor of France today decided to support the railwaymen's federation by ordering a general strike to begin at midnight of May 1.

PARIS, April 29.—Extremists who have captured control of the railroad workers federation, at attempting to make the May 1 strike a starting point for an unlimited general strike for the nationalization of public utilities. In the past plans for the day have contemplated a mere demonstration by labor.

Strike notices subject to the approval of the general labor federation have been issued by the executive committee of the railroad federation.

Railroaders' delegates were closeted with the executive committee of the general federation until late last night trying to obtain support of the revolutionary plans. As far as can be ascertained, no decision was reached.

The walls of Paris are plastered with appeals and manifestos. One appeal concluded with a bit of unconscious humor: "Do not work on May 1," it said, "so that the maxim 'he who would eat must produce,' may be applied."

U. S. SHIP COMPANIES CITED FOR CONTEMPT

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—United States Attorney L. W. Humphreys today filed in the federal court papers citing the Northwest Steel company and the Columbia River Shipbuilding corporation for alleged contempt of court. The action was taken, according to Humphreys, as a means of meeting the refusal of officials of the two companies yesterday to produce their books and records before the federal grand jury.

ARE SERMONS NECESSARY: SOME PEOPLE THINK NOT

LONDON, April 17.—Are sermons indispensable? This is one of the questions on which a decision may be taken by the bishops of the Anglican church at their meeting in Lambeth in July.

A section of churchmen are declared to hold that if a man has not the gift of preaching it would be better for everyone that he should not preach. The "two sermons each Sunday" custom, they say, imposes a great strain on the clergy—a strain equally if not more heavily felt by the laity.

START FEDERAL ACTION TO PUNISH LEADERS IN INSURGENT R. R. STRIKE

NEW YORK, April 29.—Federal action to punish leaders of the strike of railroad workers in the New York-New Jersey district was begun in Newark, N. J., today when United States District Attorney Joseph L. Bodine called a number of witnesses before a grand jury to testify regarding the strike.

Virtually all traces of the strike now have disappeared, according to statements of the various railroads.

CHICAGO, April 29.—Railroads claimed continued improvement in traffic conditions today. The strikers, now in their fifth week of the unauthorized walkout, gave no indication, however, of calling off the strike.

Seven hundred baggage transfer men, who struck last Friday for more pay, reached an agreement and arranged to work today.

SPARKS FROM THE WIRE

LONDON, April 22.—"Passyfoot" insurance is the term which has been applied to a rate of ten shillings per 100 pounds sterling now being offered in the London market to cover the risk of the passage of an act of parliament within twelve months prohibiting the sale of alcoholic liquors in England.

PAW PAW, Mich., April 29.—The case of Mrs. Sarah I. Tabor, 80 years old Lawton woman, under indictment for manslaughter, charging her with having performed or aided in an illegal operation which caused the death of her daughter, Maude Tabor Virgo, was given to the jury at 10:45 a. m.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The campaign for ratification of the federal suffrage amendment has cost the National Woman's party \$93,599.75, headquarters announced today. Most of the contributions came in small amounts from individual women, the record sum for any one month being \$18,362 in March, 1920.

NEW YORK, April 29.—A new champion Jersey cow will be proclaimed at the annual meeting of the American Jersey Cattle club here June 2, it was announced today. The new champion fat producer is "Plain Mary," whose record of 1,040 pounds of fat breaks the record held by "Vive la France."

Eleven L. W. W. members who pleaded guilty of criminal syndicalism at Los Angeles were released yesterday under suspended sentences of one to fourteen years on promise to renounce all radical affiliations and go to work.

The eight tank steamers, subject of a long discussion by the reparations commission of the peace conference, have been awarded to the United States for temporary management. The steamers were formerly operated by the Standard Oil company under the German flag.

Martial Law in Spain. MADRID, April 29.—Martial law has been proclaimed throughout the province of Oviedo, according to official announcement. This step was taken as a precaution against possible disturbances May 1.

LATEST NEWS OF THE STATE

EUGENE, Ore., April 29.—Local postoffice authorities are in receipt of letters from the inspecting service of the department cautioning them of the appearance in circulation of a number of clever counterfeit bills.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—Organization of the first civil government in Oregon will be fittingly celebrated at the historic hamlet of Champcoer near Salem, on May 1, by pioneers and the sons and daughters of pioneers.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—The crest of the smelt run in the Sandy river is believed to have been reached according to Portlanders who visited Troutdale and the banks of the Sandy river. According to veteran fishermen along the river this year's run has been a record-breaker and some smelt will continue to run upstream for several days.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., April 29.—Fire resulting from an explosion in the engine room of the mill of the Baehner Lumber company plant at North Bend, early today, did damage estimated at \$125,000. The loss to the plant is said to be fully covered by insurance.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—Billy Gibson, manager of Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion made known here today that he was endeavoring to arrange for a contest between Leonard and some premier lightweight for a ten-round no-decision contest here during the Shaine convention in June.

SPOKANE, April 29.—Henry C. Voss, a bridegroom of about three weeks, was sentenced in district court here today to a term of one to ten years in the state penitentiary following his conviction on a charge of involuntary manslaughter for fatally shooting Glen Miles, a member of a charivari party which called at his home April 13. The sentence is the minimum under the law.

SOCIALIST IMMUNITY IN PARIS SUSTAINED

PARIS, April 29.—The government won its point in the chamber of deputies today when it opposed a determined effort on the part of the reactionary and royalist section of the chamber to secure consideration of the question of suspension of immunity of Deputy Vallant-Couturier, unified socialist, so he might be prosecuted for the article published in the newspaper La Populaire on April 23. This article was addressed to the 1920 class of recruits and was considered by objectors as an effort to incite disobedience.
