MADRID, April 29.—Spanish diplomats are forbidden to marry without royal permission by a decree published today in the official gazette.

The object of the decree is to prevent diplomats marrying women without means or who possess undesirable characteristics. Similar rules are applied in the case of naval and military officers and noblemen.
