MEDFORD ELKS

HAVE GAY TIME AT GRANTS PASS

The Medford Elks arrived home from Grants Pass at 2:30 o'clock this morning well pleased with their lodge session, banquet and general entertainment there, but thoroughly disgusted with the boxing entertainment put on under the auspices of the American Legion post of that city, because the more or less famed Portland "fighters" put up a very tame—in fact stalling contests. And yet while the opinion of the Medford Elks is unanimous as to the contests, they all attach no blame to the American Legion post who hired the Portland boxers at big money to put on a meritorious exhibition.

But that banquet of last night! The Elks will never forget its tooth-someness and merit, and are loud in their praise of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Auto Park who prepared and served the delicious repast, which included loads of baked turkey, chicken and ham and all the trimmings including a half dozen different kinds of cakes. The banquet, cafeteria style, was served in the chamber of commerce rooms.

About 200 local Elks including those going on the special train and those who went by auto, participated in last night's doings. The special train arrived at the Pass at 6:45 p. m. last evening to find all the people of that city and vicinity assembled at the depot to await their arrival with the Grants Pass band.

The Elks at once formed into line and with their new band heading the procession, and the Grants Pass Elks and band following, paraded the main streets, and then went to Waldorf hall where the lodge session was held. A number of candidates were initiated, including J. B. Wimer and Russell Semon of Medford.

Following the lodge session the Elks went to the opera house to witness the boxing exhibition, after which the banquet was held, following which they then went back to Waldorf hall for a social lodge session until train time.

The preliminary was the best feature of the boxing entertainment, being a bout between two candidates, Russell Semon of Medford and Mr. Morrison of Kerby, both of whom were blindfolded and wore cow bells which notified each where his opponent was. It was a very laughable affair.

The best regular bout was between Jess Ingram of Medford and Red Campbell of Grants Pass, in which Ingram early threw up the sponge. The main event, that between Knock-out Carmen and Johnny Boscovitch of Portland was won by the former in the second round on a foul. The bout between Freddy Anderson of Portland and Jimmy Mascione of

Portland was a draw. The preliminary between Art Closex and Jake Boesch of Grants Pass was won by the latter.

Prior to the departure of the special train from this city to Grants Pass late yesterday afternoon the Elks lodge band with their humorous makeups and special stunts furnished much merriment by their parade on Main street and "concerts" in front of the Chamber of Commerce building and on the depot lawn.

PLANS TO HELP SOLDIERS

For which it is estimated \$1,800,000, 000 will be required, would be raised by four plans as follows:

Increased surtaxes of 1 per cent on net incomes between \$5000 and \$10,000; 2 per cent on incomes between \$10,000 and \$26,000 and 3 per cent on incomes above \$26,000.

One per cent on real sales to be paid by those making the sale and to apply in the case of all sales, contracts and leases, whenever made.

Tax on stocks and bonds, sales or transfers at one fifth of one per cent on the market value. Tax on produce exchange transactions at the same rate. A tax of 25 cents for each \$5 of the total amount of sales, or contract to sell lands, tenements, or other property.

Taxes on various brands of cigars, tobacco and manufactured products ranging from 15 per cent to 66 per cent, depending on the grade, and a tax of \$1 per thousand on cigarettes.

U. S. TO CONTROL WATER POWER

shall pay the original owner his net investment.

Licenses are placed under the supervision of state public service commissions as to rates and regulation of service.

The federal government, the bill provides, may take over and operate any water power under license in time of war for manufacture of explosives or any use conducive to national safety.

Senator Jones in a statement said he was informed that water power developments to be undertaken on enactment of the bill would have a capacity of more than 4,000,000 horsepower and would open up to navigation more than 4000 miles of the upper reaches of streams.

years, moving to Pittsburg, Kas.; he said he next "found himself" working for a blacksmith and while in that employment he was struck on the head and knocked unconscious by an axvil falling from the block where it rested. Then, according to the transcript of his statement, he went to a farm nearby where he lived for about two years and then he began to drift over the country.

Can't Remember Them All
His first marriage, he said, was in Canada, "during the war." He told the officers he had been married so often since that time that he could

not remember names, places, nor dates. He gave them, with frequent prompting, the following list, the first four being those whom he admitted had died either by his hand or with his connivance, according to the statement:

Nine Lee Deloney, home, Eureka, Montana, married under the name of Charles N. Harvey at San Francisco, December 5, 1919. She had property worth about \$29,000, he said.

Bertha A. Goodnick of Spokane, married under the name of H. L. Gordon at North Yakima, Wash., June 11, 1919. Her trunks have been located in a Vancouver, B. C., warehouse.

Allice M. Ludvigsen of Seattle, married under the name of Andrew Hilton, at Port Townsend, Wash., October 6, 1917. Her property, papers, will, and marriage license were found in Watson's effects.

Elizabeth Pryor of Wallace, Idaho, married under the name of Milton Lewis at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Mar. 25, 1919. Miss Pryor, who was a waitress, had little property, although some tax receipts in her name were found in Watson's possessions. Her body was found near Plum Station, Thurston county, Wash., a short time thereafter.

Other admitted marriages were: Mrs. Gertrude Wilson of Seattle, married under the name of J. P. Watson at Seattle in the summer of 1917.

Names Salem Woman
Beatrice M. Andrewartha, of Can-

ada, married under the name of Harry M. Lewis at Tacoma in February 1919.

Agnes Wilson of Alberta, married under the name of Charles Newton Harvey at Edmonton, date unknown.

Mrs. H. L. Gordon of Canada, who married him under the name of H. L. Gordon at Winnipeg April 12, 1919. He deserted her eleven days later, he says. She is now reported to be in Vancouver, B. C. Her true name is unknown.

Katherine Kruse of Nelson, B. C., whom he married under the name of James P. Watson at Nelson, June 13, 1913. She is now at Salem, Ore. A joint bank account has been located at San Diego, from which, according to the officers, Mrs. Kruse was drawing funds up to the time of Watson's arrest April 9.

Mattie Irene Root of San Francisco married under the name of H. L. Gordon at Sacramento, some time in 1919.

Maude E. Goldensmith of Wallace, Idaho, married under the name of Charles Newton at Tacoma in January 1919. She is reported to be now at Wallace and the officers here say she has expressed a wish to prosecute Watson as a bigamist.

L. A. Wife Caused Arrest
Watson's arrest was caused by Mrs. Wornbacher, the wife with whom he was living at the time. She became suspicious of his erratic movements, and called in a firm of private detectives, who soon found

enough to warrant an arrest on suspicion. Shortly after Watson was taken into custody he tried to kill himself, once by cutting his throat with a pocket knife and later by slashing his wrists. His recovery from those wounds was so slow that he was not able to talk intelligently about his case until two or three days ago.

The deaths of the four women admitted to have been slain, according to his statement, were brought about in two ways. Betty Pryor, whose body was found near Plum Station, Wash., and Nina Lee Deloney, who was killed at Long Beach while on a camping trip, were both killed by beating out their brains with a hammer, he said.

Two Wives Drowned
Bertha Goodnick was tipped out of a boat on Lake Washington, he said,

and Alice Ludvigsen met a similar fate on a river in Idaho—probably the St. Joe, the officers thought—where he had taken her for a fishing trip. The two latter deaths, he first said, were accidental, but later in his statement he referred to them as "murders."

A strong guard was established over the man today to prevent any further attempts at suicide. It was said he would be removed to the county jail very soon. He has been in a prison ward of the county hospital.

It was also intimated that the district attorney would press the local prosecution against Watson, and will vigorously resist any attempt to extradite him to the state of Washington to answer the Pryor murder charge, at least until the Deloney case had been disposed of.
