LEGION WARNED TO KEEP OUT OF POLITICAL GAME

PORTLAND, May 1.—In view of the numerous cases which have been brought to the attention of the department headquarters of the American Legion of efforts to introduce partisan political activities and to foster personal political ambitions within several of the local posts in the state, the following resolution, adopted by the department executive committee at its meeting of April 24, 1920, is quoted for the information of all posts in Oregon. It is requested that this bulletin be read at the first meeting of your post.

"Local posts are cautioned against recurrent attempts of partisan politicians to subvert the honest purposes of the American Legion in Oregon to their own selfish ends. It is only by constant vigilance that efforts along this line can be neutralized to the end that the legion while taking the most energetic interest in public affairs shall not become an instrument for purely partisan propaganda and activity.

There is no inhibition either in the national constitution or in the spirit of the Legion against ex-service men and women taking such part in political activities as they deem fit. It is not contended that any person abrogated any of his civil rights and prerogatives by reason of service in the war.

But in this great organization of war veterans, dedicated to further service not only to our comrades but in a far greater sense to the welfare of our country. It is regrettable that anyone should attempt to bring into our meetings and our work any element of partisanship and selfish interest.

It is only by clear thinking, honest effort and a close adherence to our ideals that we can maintain steadfastly the course upon which we are bent.

Posts, therefore are asked to maintain vigilance against partisan political activity of every character and to be on the alert for individuals who may approach local posts with a political axe to grind.

The attention of posts is invited further to the section of the national constitution, which reads:

"Article II, section 2.—The American Legion shall be absolutely non-political and shall not be used for the dissemination of partisan principles nor for the promotion of the candidacy of any person seeking public office or preferment. No candidate for or incumbent of a salaried elective office shall hold any office in the American Legion or in any department or post thereof."

FIRST CODDLING MOTH SPRAY FOR APPLES IS DUE

The first arsenate of lead spray for coddling moth on apples should be applied immediately after the petals fall. The exact time for this spray will vary a few days for the different sections of the county. On large orchards it is necessary to start this operation when about half of the petals have fallen in order to get over the orchard by the time the calices close.

The calyx cup of the apple will close within a weeks time after the petals fall, and if spray is not applied while the calyx cup is open it will not be possible to keep the coddling moth larvae from entering the calyx end of the apple later in the season.

It is not necessary to spray pears for coddling moth at this time because the calyx of the pear does not close like it does in the apple. However, in some pear orchards where leaf eating insects are present such as in the saw-fly larvae, green fruit worm, canker worm, cut worms, etc. Where the above insects have been troublesome it is advisable to spray the pears at this time.

Materials to Use Use powdered arsenate of lead, two to three pounds to the hundred gallons, or paste arsenate of lead four to six pounds to the hundred gallons. Where green aphids are present add one gallon of distillate oil emulsion and three fourths pint of nicotine sulphate to the hundred gallons. This combination is also very efficient as prevention for the spread of blight on pears and apples.

Use angle nozzle with good pressure and a driving spray that will penetrate so that the calyx cups will be well filled. Be sure to apply this spray before the calyx cups close. CLAUDE C. CATE, County Pathologist.

Post Office Examination. The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces an examination to establish an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the positions of clerk and carrier, post office service, Medford, Oregon. Salary, \$1000 per annum plus bonus for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920.

Both men and women will be admitted to this examination. Age limits 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination. Age limits and height and weight requirements do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service. Information and application blank may be obtained by applying to Roland G. Beach, local secretary board of civil service examiners, Medford, Oregon; or to the secretary, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service District, 303 Post Office Building, Seattle, Washington. This examination will be held on May 22, 1920.

LATEST NEWS OF THE STATE

PORTLAND, May 1.—Tiny Herman and Frank Farmer, heavyweights boxed a ten round draw last night before the Portland boxing commission. The Frankie Murphy and Stanley Willis ten round bout, light-heavyweights, also was a draw. Joe Gorman was given the decision over young Sam Langford at the end of ten rounds of fighting. Both four round affairs were pronounced draws.

SALEM, May 1.—Governor Ocott yesterday granted extradition papers after a hearing on requisition from the governor of California demanding that Jesse Hall, colored, alias J. M. Sael, be sent back to that state to answer to a forgery charge in Kern county. Halsell was under arrest in Salem.

SALEM, May 1.—The state board of control has received from the state highway commission a request to sell an additional \$1,500,000 in bonds under chapter 31, laws of 1919, the act supplanting the Bean-Barrett act and providing for the sale of bonds to match federal appropriations for the construction of post and forest roads. This amount is in addition to the \$1,000,000 offered for sale recently and on which the board refused to accept bids, for the reason that they were too low.

OLYMPIC TRYOUTS TO BE HELD PORTLAND

prisonment of the leaders of Winnipeg's general strike last year, according to reports received here. A general tieup of the building trades was reported from Ottawa, where men at work on the new parliament buildings were among those who laid down their tools. A street car attack in London, Ontario, also was reported, while in Toronto milk wagon drivers quit work.

Walkout in Seattle SEATTLE, May 1.—With master bakers and their union bakers and salesmen practically in a deadlock over the demands of the unions for increased pay, it is possible that a general strike of journeyman bakers and salesmen may take place at midnight tonight, according to leaders on both sides.

SEATTLE, May 1.—Seattle was free today of May day celebrations or demonstrations. Longshoremen were negotiating with the Seattle port commission for a change in working conditions and journeyman bakers and salesmen were asking for wage increases, but in neither instance was there any display of bitterness. Otherwise all was quiet in labor circles.

ASHLAND DELEGATE M. E. CONFERENCE IS G. F. BILLINGS

ASHLAND, May 1.—G. F. Billings, as a lay delegate, started last Friday evening for Des Moines, Iowa, to attend the great quadrennial conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, the sessions of which will continue throughout the month of May. This gathering is more than national in its scope, including the whole world, as it were, in representation as to territory. Nearly a thousand delegates will be in attendance. Age is the limitation as to active service in the Methodist fold as applying to bishops the scriptural three-score-and-ten years defining the boundaries as to when these prelates arrive at the parting of the ways as between the active and retired lists. Consequently there will be nearly a dozen of these high ecclesiastics to elect in addition to the transaction of a prodigious volume of business pertaining to the manifold interests of the church in general, both religious and secular.

Ministerial delegates from the Oregon conference include Dr. W. W. Youngson and Dr. Joshua Stansfield, both of Portland; Rev. D. H. Leach, Eugene; Rev. R. N. Avison, Salem. Lay delegates, beside Mr. Billings are Clarence Meeker, Medford; R. H. Hughes, Portland; Major Hopfield, McMinnville; Rev. S. A. Danford, of Ashland, superintendent of the Klamath district will also be in attendance ex-officio.

Des Moines, Iowa, where these hosts of Methodism are gathering, is located near the center and is the hub of Hawkeyedom, from which avenues of travel radiate in all directions. In this particular, its geographical status resembles that of Indianapolis, Ind., or Columbus, O. Mr. Billings went by the central-southern route in order to take advantage of a brief stop at Sacramento. He will be away several weeks, and may visit other localities in the vicinity of Des Moines.
