

FORMER MEDFORD WOMAN PASSES AWAY AT HOME

It is with deepest sorrow that we are called upon to record the passing of one of the best loved members of this community. At her residence on Lighthouse avenue at 1:30 o'clock in the morning of April 15th, Mrs. Carrie Lillian Johnson closed her eyes in her last sleep. Mrs. Johnson was born in Santa Cruz, May 15th, 1862. After a girlhood spent in Santa Clara and Salinas she came in 1882 to Pacific Grove, where her father, D. W. Lloyd, was a pioneer merchant, and where she taught the first school. On January 19th, 1886, she was married to Mr. Joseph O. Johnson, then superintendent of the P. I. Co.'s holdings on this peninsula. In this connection we might recall the fact that it was Mr. Johnson who consummated the deal with the Jacks Corporation for the purchase of the "Pacific Grove Retreat" and platted the townsite of Pacific Grove. In 1889 the family moved to Medford, Oregon, where Mr. Johnson died in 1896. In 1901 Mrs. Johnson returned to Pacific Grove and has resided here ever since except for a few years spent in Palo Alto while her daughters were in college. All her life Mrs. Johnson has been a devoted and active member of the local Methodist Episcopal congregation and was its first organist, a labor of love which she performed for five years. Mrs. Johnson is survived by three daughters, Misses C. Jette, and Mabel of Pacific Grove, and Mrs. Clyde Zumwalt of Tulare; also by three sisters, Miss Etta B. Lloyd of Pacific Grove, Miss Leonia Lloyd of San Francisco, and Mrs. Meyer Dinkelspiel of Los Angeles, and a nephew, Mr. Lloyd Weil of Los Angeles.

The wealth of beautiful blossoms which surrounded the casket and filled the rooms bore ample testimony to the esteem in which Mrs. Johnson was held. Out of respect to the memory of the deceased, the stores in the Lloyd building were closed during the funeral services. It is hard when the heart is full, to pay a worthy tribute to one whose passing means such a loss to her friends. None knew her but to love her and the simple sweetness of a beautiful nature never failed to impress those who came in contact with her, and to those who were privileged to call her friend, the memory of her marvelous patience and cheerfulness during a prolonged illness will ever be an unobscuring inspiration.—Pacific Grove Review.

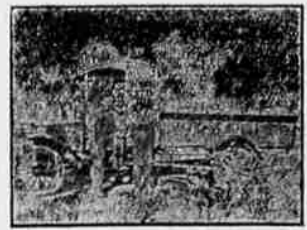
