PROTECT THE HIGHWAYS

IT TAKES no seventh son of a seventh son to predict the railroads of the future are to be paved highways. Between Ashland and Medford today the paved highway is the road bed for transportation of passengers and freight, with trucks and automobiles as the rolling stock. This condition exists elsewhere and is growing.

But the people of Jackson county paid for this Ashland-Medford road bed. And under the present law the future road beds are paid for and maintained by the owners of motor vehicles. This is a step in the right direction, but it doesn't go far enough.

For as members of the state highway commission pointed out Monday night, the paved highways thus far constructed, are only adapted to a ten-ton load. Heavier loads are now being transported and the pavement is breaking down under them.

One thing is certain, the load in excess of ten tons must be eliminated from highways now built to bear no more than that tonnage if these highways are not to be destroyed. Another thing is certain, a law which puts the burden of road construction and maintenance more strongly upon the business interests chiefly benefitted, is imperative.

THE LAZY HOME GARDNER

SEED dealers in various places report that there is less demand for seeds this year on the part of home gardeners. In some states the decrease amounts to as much as 30 per cent.

Unless this is to be explained by the weather, it shows a curious and disquieting situation. With prices of food so high, it might be supposed that there would be a stronger tendency than ever for the man with a garden plot to raise his own vegetables. There is little or no indication of lower prices, for farmers and professional gardeners say they are obliged to curtail their cultivated area on account of the labor shortage. The chief hope, then, of an easement in food prices, seems to rest with the "the back yard farmers."

It may be futile to say that farmers of this type, or any other type, owe it to the community to do all they can to boost the food supply. "Duty to the community" is not so popular just now as it used to be. But the potential gardener who neglects the opportunity will certainly be sorry, on his own account, before the season is over.

I heard today of a mother of four children saying that she did not remember buying a quart of milk since she had been married. "How do they do it?" This was a case for the humane society, and a rather exceptional specimen of laziness; but there are many children who do not get enough milk.

Indeed, many more children are under-nourished than are underfed. Most people give their children enough to eat; but they do not give them enough to live and grow on, for what the children get is not what they need.

Condensed milk is not a fit food for the feeding of a growing human being. It will do at a pinch and it will serve as an addition to other foods; but the vitamins are gone and alone they act a good deal like some of the foods we hear of in certain sections of the world—they lead to those queer and but recently understood diseases known as malnutrition diseases—scurvy, beri-beri, pellagra, and the rest. People are not hungry but they are deprived of that variety which furnishes all that is needed. And the lack comes to the surface in a skin or bone disease or mayhap in stunted growth or stupidity in school.

LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to permit the creation of debts and liabilities including previous debts and liabilities for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent as now provided by law.
