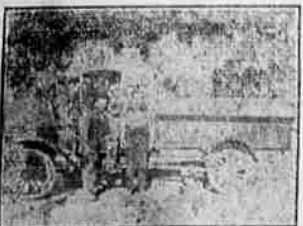

### Pointdexter Out of It.

SALEM, Ore., May 4.—Acting on advice received from Attorney General Brown, Sam A. Kozor, deputy secretary of state, has telegraphed Oregon county clerks to remove the name of Miles Pointdexter from the ballots as a republican aspirant for the presidential nomination.

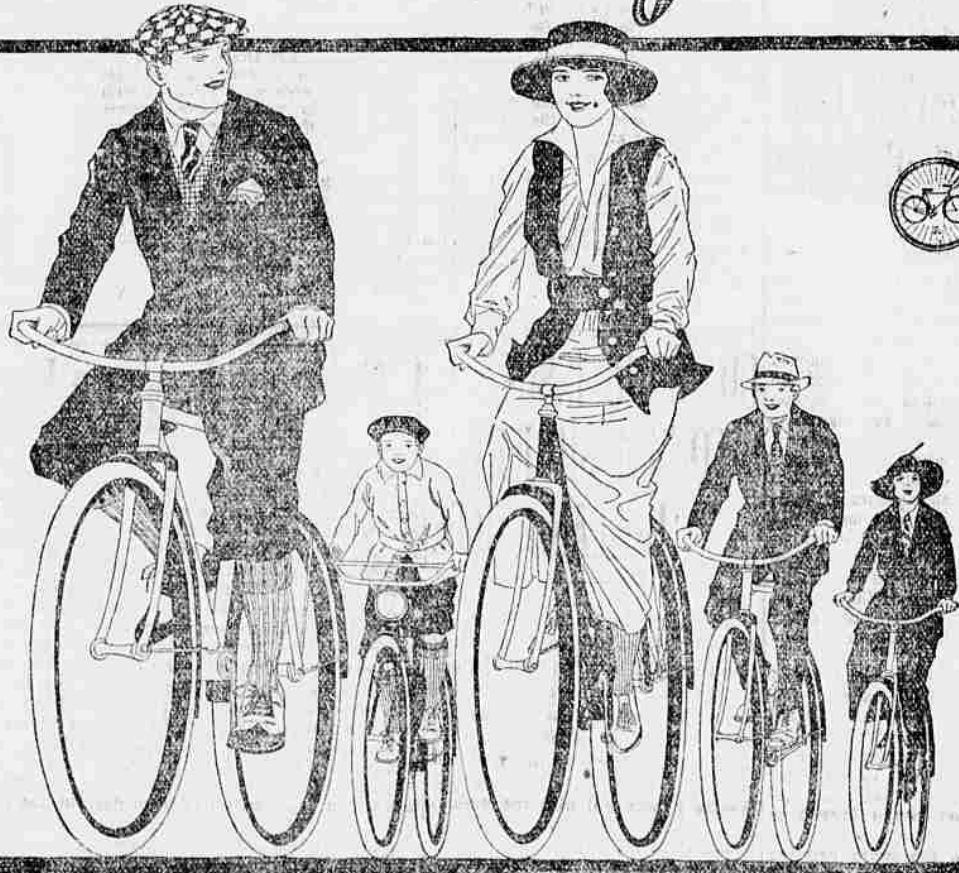

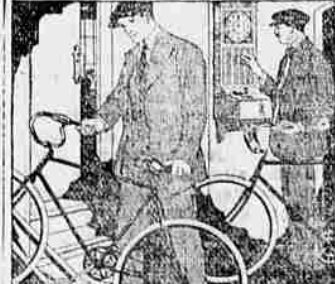
