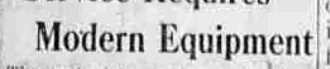

THE OUIJA BOARD

WHAT is going to happen to Hiram Johnson at the Chicago convention?

Hiram is going there, certainly, with quite a bevy of delegates. He is going there with the most aggressive and conspicuous personal following of any politician in the United States. Not only will he have Michigan, Nebraska, North Dakota, Montana, Wisconsin, California portions of New Jersey, South Dakota and Minnesota; but he is going there with a strong popular following in nearly every other state. For be it not forgotten that where Johnson has not won, he has come powerful near it. Examine the result in Illinois for example; Ohio and Indiana also. There are well defined Johnson tracks everywhere.

It is not conceivable Johnson will go to Wood—the rival he has successfully harpooned as Prussian militarist and vote buyer. It is less conceivable he will go to Hoover—the man who dared challenge his supremacy in his own state.

To whom will he go then,—why of course he will go to Johnson. But there is about as much chance of the convention going to him as there is of John D. Rockefeller going to the poor house. Of course the Democrats are praying for such a miracle, but Democratic prayers and Democratic miracles promise to find the coliseum atmosphere a rudely unsympathetic medium.

Wherefore, we approach what diplomats term an impasse. The Republican candidate will not be for Johnson, and Johnson will not be for the Republican candidate.

Wherefore, and also to wit,—Fighting Hiram will walk out of the convention, somewhat as he did in 1912, with blood in his eye and a brick in each hand. Only he will be the mourner and the corpse this time. No "vice" for Hiram in 1920. Big Bill Thompson of Chicago will attend to that. Johnson and Thompson will sound well, unless Johnson and Hearst should sound better.

In other words a third party is formed. A forlorn hope cry the dopesters. But is it,—or will it be? The regular Republicans will vote for the regular Republican nominee, the regular Democrats will vote for the regular Democratic nominee, and the League of Nation haters, the alien dissenters, the outs who want to be in and the ins who have been kicked out united from both parties, will go down the line for Hiram.

Wherefore, Hiram is President and,—in what devious ways political wonders are performed!—A new political party is born.

You don't believe it? Sounds fishy, fantastic? But that is what the Ouija Board said last night just as the California returns came in. And the Ouija Board, of course, never lies.

UNITE ON HOOVER.

AS THE parlor Bolshevik would say, the idea above is intriguing. But the immediate concern, not only with the Republican party, but with the country at large, is to unite on the candidate who can repudiate the Ouija.

The objection is not against Johnson as a man, but the forces behind him. With Hearst in the lead he represents the most dangerous elements in the country today. He not only opposes reorganizing the world for peace, he not only opposes those ideals which must be obtained if this world is to be made safe for civilization, but he is, in spite of himself, the leader of the radical malcontents, who would completely disorganize domestic affairs, if given control.

The selection of available candidates lies between Hoover and Wood. In appraising Hoover's strength, it must be remembered that he entered the race late, without the support of any political organization, without funds, without making a campaign or having others make it for him, and yet he enjoys a popular following which even his opponents must admit.

In every poll taken in Oregon and Washington Hoover has led. By keeping out of the favorite son states except in California, he has escaped the hostility of various important factions.

But more important Hoover is the man above all others best qualified for the job. The man who could not only unite the Republican party East and West, but could secure the independent and progressive vote, which in the presidential election will be such an important factor.

The Johnson showing finally disposes of the fiction that the Republican party can win with anyone. It is plain, the Republican party must have the strongest candidate obtainable. In our judgment Hoover is that man.
