ASHLAND, May 5—The May day observance this year will be on Friday evening, the 7th. The scene—and it will be a gay one—will be at the armory, the event being under auspices of the auxiliary club, the most popular organization in town, when it comes to staging social entertainments par excellence. Lamnsaph orchestra will afford the musical accompaniments for this May day merry-making, and all other phases of the social dancing party will be on the same elevating plane as the music. The committee on decoration will see to it that the armory environment is made as attractive as possible at this spring time period of buds and blossoms. Refreshments will be available also. In fact, the pleasures of the evening will twofold the season when merry-making is in flower. To attend this jolly affair is to be entertained, hence all should be there to welcome the advent of the spring time season, and are cordially welcomed in return.

Chicken fanciers have, in convention assembled, adopted the rabbits foot as a symbol of good luck, hence their organization will hereafter be known as the Southern Oregon Poultry and Rabbit association, a lot of other net stock also to be included in the annual exhibits.

Judges Calkins of Jackson and Skipworth of Lane county circuit courts respectively, are occupied lately in passing upon sensational murder and robbery cases, convicted criminals in each instance seeking new trials. In Lane county Martin Clark figured in an atrocious murder, and in Josephine county the notorious Lark Evans was sentenced to 15 years for highway robbery.

Arthur Conklin, formerly of Grants Pass and now of Eugene, has been in town this week as traveling representative of electric appliances. In years past he was a heavy reality operator in both Jackson and Josephine counties, and at one time controlled the Vendome property in this city.

Klamath county residents are again in a turmoil over the application of J. E. Paddock for a parole, he having killed O. T. McKendree over stage range disputes some time ago.

Frank Moore, home from the coast section last week, got word that the cabin on his ranch near Harbor in Curry county, had been destroyed by fire, the loss being total as to building and contents. A caretaker was supposed to be looking after the property during his absence.

Itinerary service between Ashland and Klamath Falls is now over the Green Springs roadway, which is passable even at this early season of the year. Daily stage to and fro, with mail and light baggage added to passenger equipment. The detour via Azer was but for a few days only.

After all surmises as to cost of the overhead railroad crossing on the Pacific Highway east of Ashland, the contract price, as awarded to D. M. Stevenson, is to be \$35,457.50, way below most people's estimates, as the figures had been placed all the way from \$50,000 to double that amount. An instance further is cited as to the Rock Point bridge at Gold Hill, some people believing that the cost would be over \$100,000, whereas it was about \$50,000. Nearly 50,000 pounds of steel reinforcement will be used in the Ashland crossing. Highway work comes "high," but the average estimate on certain phases of the improvement overreaches the actual cost.

The sewing lessons under way at the Temple of Truth last week were attended, and being conducted by competent instructors, the work has given rise to a demand for the institution of a millinery school as a fine art adjunct to the scope of plainer work.
