WOOD'S PLURALITY OVER JOHNSON IN INDIANA, 10,000

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 6.—Major General Leonard Wood with a total of 81,574 votes apparently is assured of a plurality of almost ten thousand over Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California, who has 72,432 on the fact of unofficial returns from 3,183 precincts out of 3,387 in Indiana in Tuesday's presidential preference primary election. The 294 missing precincts are in fourteen scattered counties of the 92 in the state.

Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois with a total of 36,682 votes continues in third place, while Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio is fourth with 19,216.

General Wood, returns indicate, has carried nine of the thirteen congressional districts in the state and has a plurality of fifty three counties where unofficial reports are completed. Senator Johnson won four congressional districts and 24 counties. Governor Lowden carried three counties and Senator Harding one Ohio county. Fourteen counties are in doubt.

Marion county (Indianapolis) complete gave Wood a plurality over Johnson of 7809 while Lake county in the "Calumet" region has given Johnson a plurality of 5948 over Wood in 71 out of 99 precincts reporting. In Lake county Johnson has polled 250 per cent more votes than the total of his three opponents.

Interest already has begun to shift to the republican state convention next Wednesday and Thursday. The question of whether Indiana's 26 delegates to the national convention at Chicago shall go instructed for

General Wood because of his plurality or uninstructed transcends all other conversation now at the political headquarters. The state law provides that only a majority of the votes cast is binding on the delegates.

Decrate Graves.
PARIS, May 6.—Hugh C. Wallace, American ambassador to France has been named honorary president of the American Memorial day committee and has issued an appeal for funds to carry out the announced plan of "placing a floral tribute on every American grave on this side of the Atlantic."

Operations of the committee will be extended to Spain, Germany, England and the Orkney islands.
