A WEATHER PREDICTION

THERE will be an earthquake in San Francisco the first of July. The weather prophets can't see it, but the political prophets can. The immovable body of Wilsonism, is to meet the irresistible force of Bryanism, and the political seismographs, from Tampa to Puget Sound, are going to hop around like globules of grease on a pan cake griddle.

Of course the Native Sons of California will be scandalized, but we venture the prediction another Democratic convention will never be held within a thousand miles of the Golden Gate. They may point to the beauties of their Climate and the atrocities of the forecaster at Chicago, but the worst that can happen on the shores of lake Michigan is a frost, complicated perhaps by highway robbery. The makings of an earthquake simply are not there.

But in San Francisco, wow—ee! Watch the political edifices totter and tumble, when Bryan and his former chief take the mat, with Governor Edwards, swinging a demi-john, in the hope of landing on some vital part of the articulate anatomy from Lincoln, Nebraska. We trust the Oregonian delegation will have quarters in a one-story building. They will need it.

For as a matter of fact, clearing away the cob webs of a vanishing partizanship, two opposing parties are meeting both in Chicago and San Francisco. Issues, not badges, make parties. It is generally agreed one of the main issues is to be the Peace Treaty and League of Nations. But there is about as much concord and unanimity on this important question, within the ranks of the two parties, as one would find at a Sinn Fein picnic in Belfast.

Mr. Bryan agrees with Mr. Lodge, Mr. Reed agrees with Mr. Johnson, and Mr. Wilson,—ahem,—agrees with Mr. Wilson. But while earthquakes are regrettable,—not even subjects for polite conversation in California,—scientists tell us, viewing this sphere of dirt as a whole, they have a beneficent bearing. For if the earth's crust under pressure from below refused to yield in certain places, the whole darned thing would explode.

So, perhaps, with political earthquakes. They are hard to endure, but they probably represent a medium of subterranean readjustment, essential to life and continuity of our political institutions. It is not improbable, therefore, that out of the winds and frosts of Chicago, the quakes and eruptions of San Francisco, two new, organic political entities will emerge, purged of their mal adjustments, and purified by the white light of united and opposing convictions.

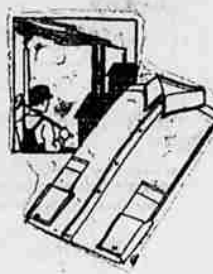
