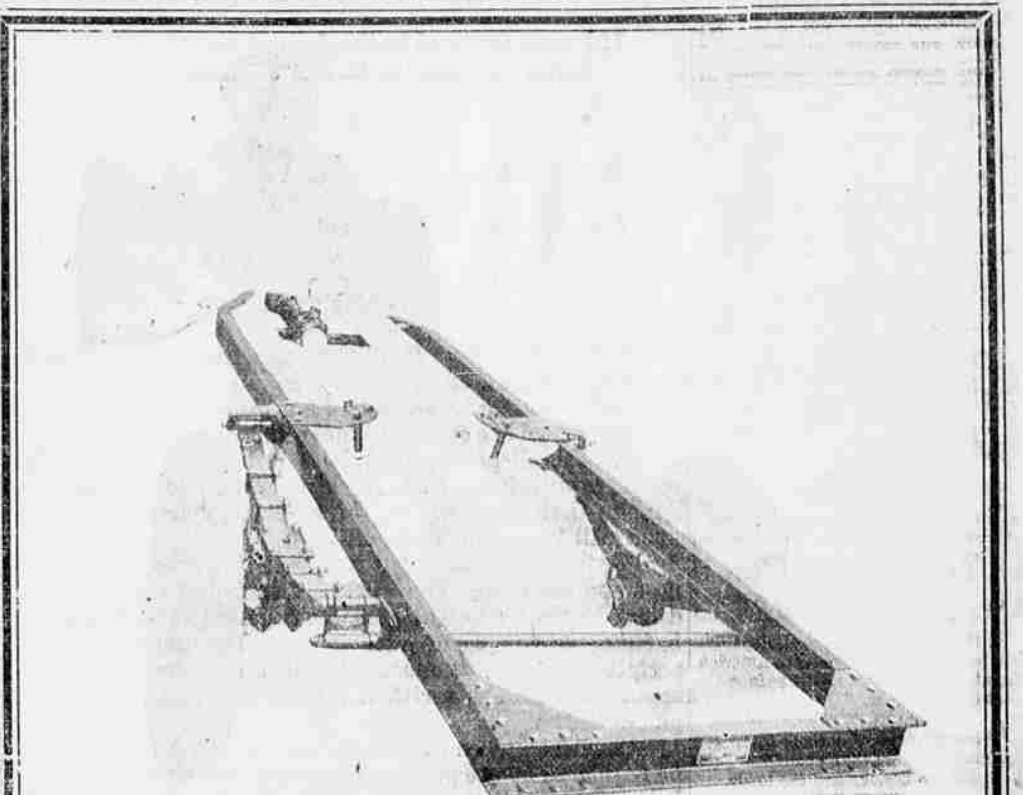

MONDAY, WEDNESDAY AND FRIDAY, on the East side of the Streets running North and South, and North side of all Streets running East and West. TUESDAY, THURSDAY AND SATURDAY, on the West side of all Streets running North and South, and on the South side of all Streets running East and West. SUNDAY FORENOON on the East side of all Streets running North and South, and the North side of all Streets running East and West. SUNDAY AFTERNOON on the West side of all Streets running North and South, and the South Side of all Streets running East and West. Wasteful use of water or USING AN OPEN END HOSE for irrigating will not be permitted. Corner property will be governed by the street on which the house is numbered.
