Tribune's Daily Health Hint

Tapeworms are not so "popular" as they used to be. This is chiefly due to our more accurate knowledge of food and its preparation.

The tapeworm is a parasite that requires two "hosts" or animals to live in. There are, in other words, two different stages of its life.

The tapeworm as we know it lives in the body of man or of some other animal, making its home in the digestive tract. Here it grows in sections, like the links of a scale bracelet.

These links separate from their fellows from time to time and are voided. They are full of eggs, and these eggs are eaten by some animal, where they develop into an animal

different from the tape worm, but which, when the first animal (or man) eats the animal, develops into the tape worm again.

A recently reported case of tape worm was developed by a man who when he lived in Russia ate a good deal of raw fish. The worm is traced to this. The fishes were the other "hosts" of the worm. The danger of this "alteration of generation" as it is called, is the tremendous number of eggs passed by one person, and in the case just cited, the large possible number of fishes that might eat the eggs and whose bodies eaten in turn by man produce an endless array of tape worm.

However, the array is very effectively stopped by our habit of cooking our fishes before we eat them. All these parasitic diseases are controlled by cooking, and it is this that has reduced their prevalence. Raw meat of any kind is more or less danger-

ous. Pork improperly cooked may harbor Trichina spiralis, a curious little thing curled up in the muscle of the hog and which when eaten gnaws its way through the intestinal wall and causes the disease called trichinosis.

A thoroughly cooked diet eliminates all these dangers.

WILLIAM DEAN HOWELLS

THE DEATH of William Dean Howells comes as a gentle reminder of a generation that has passed. Characterized six years ago by William Howard Taft as "the greatest living American writer and novelist" the dean of American letters, poet essayist dramatist and editor, Mr. Howells, nevertheless belonged to the literary school of Longfellow, Lowell and Holmes, rather than the school of the modern American realists.

His greatness will lie not in his matter so much as his treatment, not in his force and vigor, so much as his style and gracious humor, not in his genius and vital characterizations, so much as his faculty for expressing his own spirit of culture and idealism in artistically harmonized literary symbols.

In this present age of audacious innovation, with the world scrambling for new sensations, with jazz competing with pep for public favor, with the old-fashioned moralists beating a strategic and rather undignified retreat, before the offensive of cheek-by-jowl best sellers, it is refreshing to contemplate the quiet dignity, the wholesome and restful atmosphere, with which the Editor's Easy Chair was for so many years surrounded.

Primarily a poet and artist, William Dean Howells nevertheless took a keen interest in current affairs. He was fastidious without being exclusive, he was primarily an observer of affairs and yet intellectually he never withdrew from them. Several years ago he avowed his belief in socialism, but the modern direct actionist merely amused him.

"I cannot see" he declared, "that the remedy for existing conditions lies anywhere else. But if it is to be a remedy it must come slowly. Violent revolutions do not permanently solve such problems."

"He has the manhood of an apple blossom," shouted a soap box orator in Madison Square, but Mr. Howells was undisturbed. He had demonstrated that manhood need not be vitiated by good manners.

On the subject of woman suffrage his opinion was decided:

"It is one of the most important developments of this generation and one of the most hopeful. The men have made such a mess of things that if the women do not come to the rescue I don't know what is to become of us."

Mr. Howells died when all rational beings would like to die, when their work and life is over. He would have no place in the age that is dawning, he would not understand the age, the age would not understand him.

DON'T PLAY THE RACES.

SOME people seem to regard the presidential primary as a horse race. Their only interest is in backing the betting favorite. Such people promise to attain about as much success as most amateurs who play the ponies. When the race is over, they won't have even their "principle" left.

For this is a preferential primary. People are asked to vote for the candidate they prefer, not for the candidate they think a majority of their fellow citizens prefer. The voter who in his heart prefers Wood, but votes for Hoover, or prefers Hoover but votes for Wood, or prefers Lowden but votes for Johnson, for fear he may waste his vote, is wasting his vote at the outset.

If you have made up your mind who is the best man in the race, from your standpoint, have the courage of your convictions and vote for that man. An honest vote is never wasted. But a gambler's vote is worse than wasted, for it strikes at the very framework of our preferential system, and renders any primary a farce.
