MEDFORD DEBATERS WILL CONTEST FOR HONORS OF STATE

Two teams of Medford high school debaters with their coach, Miss Lundas, departed this morning for Eugene to participate as southern Oregon representatives in the Oregon High School Debating association's debate which begins there Thursday and ends Saturday.

The members of the two teams, one affirmative and the other negative on the question to be debated are: Affirmative, Miss Deris Reynolds and Frank Buchter; negative, Leonard Brown and Maurice McKeaney. The question for debate is "Resolved, that the Japanese should be admitted to privileges of American citizenship on the same basis as the people of European nations."

The following high schools will be represented in the debate: Corvallis, Pendleton, Enterprise, Salem, Medford, Lakeview, The Dalles, Marshfield and Eugene. Elimination debates will be held until Saturday evening, when the final debate will be held between the two remaining teams.

To the Tax Payers and Voters of Jackson County

As justice to the tax payers and myself, I feel it my duty to make a short reply to an article printed in the Mail Tribune on April 12th, by my opponent for nomination at the May primaries for sheriff.

By consulting the county records anyone may ascertain for themselves that the sheriff's office has been run at a minimum expense during my term of office as sheriff, and I may add that I have been serving as juvenile and truant officer for the county and not incurring any extra expenses on the county for such services.

It also may be noted that during my time in office I have notified present owners of property (not required by law) where old delinquencies existed, and thereby giving the owners the opportunity of redeeming their property without extra expense, where if such had not been done, people's property could have been sold to anyone applying, and owners then would have been at the mercy of the purchaser.

My opponent, Mr. Wimer, makes mention that he can save the tax payers from \$500.00 to \$1000.00 on making up the tax receipts, which if true would be quite a saving, for the cost of printing and making up the tax receipts this spring was less than \$1000.00, and as to the hours of the office, the present hours are from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and when business of the office so demands it can be arranged to keep the office open during the noon hour.

My record in the office during the first term is not based upon estimates and promises, but stand on showings made. I am not an advocate of continued re-election for more than second term, but I know that the greater part of an officer's first term is spent in learning his office and that there is extra expense to the county in too frequent change of officers, and that the office cannot render the service during the first term that can be rendered during second.

With these facts and not promises, I solicit your support at the May primaries, May 21st, and re-election in November.

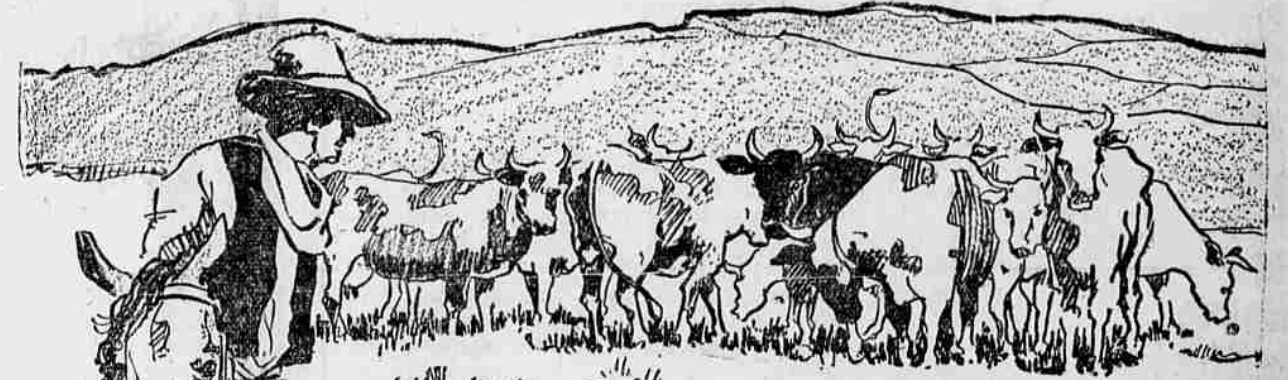
