ing from our entrance into the war," declared the secretary. "But even then, Admiral Sims said it had not been definitely decided on by the war council, though the daring and successful attack on Zeppelins came much later. It might have been a very different story if it had been undertaken earlier when the navy department was urging some such bold plan, all of which Admiral Sims thought 'impracticable' when urged by the navy department."

Discredited U. S. Navy

Admiral Sims told the president he had been shown studies of the department's plan to prevent the egress of submarines, Mr. Daniels said, and that he considered the scheme impracticable. "He evidently sought to discredit the navy department's plans by saying that these same suggestions and many similar ones had been made by people of all classes since the beginning of the war," said Mr. Daniels. Sims' cable to the president suggested that the proper policy to pursue was to adopt the recommendations he had made to the department, "most of which had been decided upon and put in operation before Admiral Sims suggested them," Secretary Daniels said. "He added," the secretary continued, "that we should adopt an organization similar in all respects to the British squadron and virtually transfer all navy authority to his headquarters in London."
