SOCIALISTIC SENSE

NOW AND then a socialist shows signs of practical wisdom. At the socialist convention Wednesday one of the delegates opposing the radical wing said:

The trouble with a dictatorship of the proletariat in this country is the proletariat doesn't want it. Nine workers out of ten believe in the capitalist system because they think they may be a capitalist tomorrow.

Sound Yankee sense that. And as long as free opportunity exists in this country as it does today, the Bolsheviks have about as much chance of gaining control, as the Holy Rollers.

We hear a great deal of talk about classes, but as a matter of fact there are no classes in this country, in any permanent sense. The capitalist of today is the laborer of tomorrow, the laborer of this year, is the capitalist of next. Socially and economically the country is in a constant state of flux.

Doubters have never ridden in that typically American conveyance crudely christened the rubberneck wagon. WITH MEDFORD TRADE IS MEDFORD MADE

ALLIES TO OCCUPY CONSTANTINOPLE BY TURK TREATY

WASHINGTON, May 13.—(By Associated Press.) Permanent occupation of Constantinople which is left under the sovereignty of the sultan, by a small international force of allied troops, is provided for in the treaty which has been handed to the Turkish representatives at Paris. An official summary of the treaty has been received here.

A similar international guard is provided for the garrisoning of the straits as a guarantee of free passage thru the Dardanelles and the Sea of Marmora to ships of all nations.

An inter-allied commission of control will exercise supervision over the execution of the clauses of the treaty.

Thrace in its entirety is awarded to Greece. Smyrna and the Hinterland, extending approximately to a depth of 100 kilometers and a breadth of 200 kilometers, is given Greece under limited sovereignty. Greece must formulate, with the League of Nations, a plan for control of the territory and in two years the population will decide whether this arrangement shall be continued or whether the territory shall be annexed by Greece.

Both France and Italy reserve only special economic privileges in Cilicia and Adalia. Boundaries of Mesopotamia and Palestine are left to be determined by special commissions.

The Armenian settlement is left open for future negotiation and decision.

The precise status of the inter-allied commission of control in its relation to the League of Nations is not clearly defined.
