

ENGLISHMAN TO GO OVER NIAGRA FALLS IN BARREL

BRISTOL, Eng.—Charles George Stephens, a barber of this town, has announced that he is going to try to shoot Niagara Falls in a barrel.

He has booked his passage from Liverpool to Quebec on June 18 and says he intends to make the attempt at the end of June or early in July.

Stephens is 50 years of age and stands 5 feet 9 1/2 inches. The barrel will be 6 feet, 2 inches and in the middle 32 inches. Inside the barrel Stephens plans to be secured by straps and the barrel is to be weighted at the bottom with a hundred-pound weight to keep it upright in the water. Special breathing apparatus is also being fitted.

Among the many other feats which Stephens claims to have performed are the following:

Kissing a lion in its den, shaving customers in a lion's den, boxing in a lion's den and parachute descents from balloons; for which feats he boasts three ribbons, five gold medals and six silver medals.

To shoot Niagara Falls in a barrel has been the ambition of numerous persons seeking notoriety, but few have accomplished it. Mrs. Anna Edson Taylor, who went over the falls in a wooden barrel about 1901 was severely injured, but recovered.
