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FOR CHAMBERLAIN,—WITH RESERVATIONS

PRESIDENT WILSON'S message to Gilbert Hamaker of Portland puts Oregon democrats in a quandry. The message insists upon unqualified support of the league covenant, and flatly opposes the Lodge reservations.

But Senator Chamberlain voted for the Lodge reservations. The natural assumption is the president expects his party in this state to vote against "Our George." But will they? We rather doubt it.

In our opinion the majority of the Democrats will vote for Senator Chamberlain with mental reservations. They will vote for him because they realize his defeat will mean the election of a Republican to the senate. They will vote for him in spite of his record on the peace treaty instead of because of it.

There is a good deal in what Senator McCumber has said about the peace treaty as an issue in the campaign. Party lines will not be drawn strictly on treaty lines. There are too many other considerations involved. In fact, the probabilities are both major parties will endorse the league with reservations, the only difference being a milder form for the Democrats than the Republicans.

Both parties will then claim possession of the only genuine article, but the rank and file, will largely discount the entire question, and support the party which, in their opinion, gives the best prospect of returning the country to a basis of economic stability, and alleviating this devastating sickness of discontent.

The most conspicuous phenomena today is general disgust with the whole political performance. The people are wearied to death with congress, with propoganda, with the time honored bunk of a bygone age. They want a new deal all around, and they are going to vote for the party that gives the best promise of securing it.

There are two important rules to observe in the primary election regarding the amendments, local and state candidates. On the latter, vote for the man best qualified for the job, regardless of all other considerations, on the amendments, don't vote at all unless you know what the amendment means. In other words, study the ballot now secure all the information you can, and with this knowledge at hand, vote accordingly. An ignorant vote is worse than no vote at all.

If you didn't read the questions and answers on the county road bond issue in yesterday's paper, read them today. There is the entire situation in a nutshell. If you want \$900,000 of outside money spent in Jackson County for farm roads, vote for the bonds.

We can't help but admire Johnson's virtuosity. He has the radical vote salted, now he will tour the east and show the business men he isn't what the radicals think he is.

The voter who just paid 24 cents a pound for sugar will have a pretty friendly feeling for Hoover when he gets in the voting booth.
