C. OF COMMERCE PUTS LID UPON MONEY SPENDING

The board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce met at headquarters last evening and disposed of an immense amount of details thereby clearing up all re-organization matters and the institution is now being conducted along lines as advocated by the American City Bureau which incorporates the most modern and successful methods used by the best equipped commercial organizations in the country.

A recommendation made at the last forum meeting was accepted and a committee will be appointed when most advisable for such a committee to act.

A proposition was made the board for an advertising scheme, but the board found the same inadvisable to accept and sat on the lid of the treasury with a firmness that was convincing that they were guarding the funds of the organization with the utmost watchfulness. A feeling exists among the board members that the Chamber of Commerce is actually on trial this year and that a double precaution must be taken that not one cent of the funds under their control is wasted or is spent for any purpose but what will bring 100 per cent results. If all of the suggestions had been accepted by the board made by some of the members, all of the funds of the institution would long ago have been spent. There are some members who are under the impression that the Chamber of Commerce has the entire funds for their disposal for the year on hand, but this is not the case, as a greater proportion of the members have taken advantage of the privilege of paying only quarterly in advance. A report from the secretary showed that a very satisfactory number of the members have paid their dues and budget subscriptions.

As soon as the aviation field is completed, it will be dedicated and a committee was authorized to be appointed to take charge of the dedication ceremonies.

SMALL AUDIENCE HEARS GOODSSELL PRAISE JOHNSON

A small audience gathered in the city park last night to hear Judge Rex Goodsell of San Bernardino, Calif., speak in favor of Senator Hiram Johnson for president of the United States. Judge Goodsell briefly sketched the career of Johnson in California and pointed to his strong support in all parts of the United States. In South Dakota where the speaker campaigned he maintained Johnson won every county but one where there was any Johnson organization, and that every vote secured by the Wood organization cost them three dollars. He maintained the rank and file of the American people were for Johnson because of his stalwart Americanism, and appealed to his hearers to put a western man in the White House so that Oregon could be recognized as a part of the country and a state which deserved to be recognized for something more than a rain belt which produced a few apples.

In closing the speaker applauded Johnson's stand opposing any league of nations and maintained this to be the greatest service he had ever rendered the American people. Johnson's charge that the League of Nations was written by Lloyd-George and drafted to rob Uncle Sam for John Bull's benefit was repeated, while the regal elegance of President Wilson's entourage on his visit to Paris was dilated upon, as was his determination to force the document down the throat of the American people.

The audience though small, there being only about fifty people gathered around the band stand from the base of which Judge Goodsell spoke, showed considerable enthusiasm and applauded frequently.

Following the meeting a local Johnson club was formed as follows: President, J. F. Hale; vice-president, H. K. Hanna; secretary, L. Zundell; executive committee, Merrill Kellogg and R. M. Harrison.

Company D, national guard is these days making some stir in and about Medford. The company for several months was somewhat backward about doing things on account of practically all its equipment being delayed so long, but now with first-class equipment and fully supplied, the members are planning some great times in the near future.

One of the big affairs for the company this summer, however, is the trip to Camp Lewis, where the entire regiment with others will encamp and have the chance to visit one of the largest and best military camps in the United States.

There is room in the company for about twenty new men, but until this time, because of the equipment not having arrived, the company was handicapped in recruiting as well as in other ways, but now with the fine new equipment, Company D offers an opportunity to all men between the ages of 18 and 45 years. The company needs the new members, and many outside would be benefitted by the instructions. The Ashland company has put on a drive for recruits and are enlisting many, and Medford should still be at the front, as the local company was the first company organized and sworn in by the state of Oregon, for the new regiment, which was federalized about ten months ago.

It is hoped that all citizens will get behind the company and boost. Many young men in the city and vicinity would be benefitted by the drill and instructions in the company, and the company needs the help and assistance of these men.

BALLOT TITLE IS AS FOLLOWS:

302 X Yes CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Referred to the people by the Legislative Assembly

303 No LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to permit the issuance of bonds and liabilities including previous debts and liabilities for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent as now provided by law.

NO PROPERTY TAX—NO DIRECT TAX
NO INCREASE IN AUTO LICENSE FEES
NO INCREASE OF GASOLINE TAX

FEDERAL FUNDS MUST BE MATCHED

Oregon must have sufficient Highway Funds, to match Federal apportionments or Oregon cannot get the benefit of Federal money for Oregon Roads. Increasing this constitutional limit is a necessity. Unless limits are increased, either the state funds cannot be completed for many, many years, or must be financed by direct property taxation.
