## SIGNED STATEMENT FROM COUNTY COURT REGARDING ROAD BOND ISSUE

Under the law for issuing bonds the County Court must make a levy after four years to retire same.

The Pacific Highway bonds were issued in 1913 and in 1917 and each year since a levy has been made so that with this year's collections, there will be on hand \$120,000 for retiring said issue.

By carrying the road bond issue on May 21, the bonds will not be issued until needed.

There will not be any necessity to issue any bonds until 1921 even though contracts are signed up for the work this summer, as the contracts will be awarded to run over into next year as work can only get started this year. Thus, it will be seen that five years will elapse before any levy will be made to retire the issue voted this year, and in the meantime the 1913 issue will have been reduced to \$113,000, requiring at that time a levy of 1.5 mills, against 2.5 mills at present.

The warrant indebtedness will be paid in two years more by a 2 mill levy next year and 1 mill the following.

If present bond issue carries, the status of levies for county indebtedness for following seven years, including 1920 levy, will be as follows:

Above tabulation is conservative as it is based on present valuations, any increase in the valuation as shown by tax rolls will reduce the levy accordingly. Further, the tabulation does not take into consideration interest earnings on the sinking fund, which fund is being invested now at 6 percent interest.

Unless the road bond issue carries on May 21st, the County Court will be greatly handicapped in competing for state and government co-operation in a comprehensive road program.
