GUS NEWBERRY URGES SUPPORT MILLAGE BILL

To the Editor:
A very serious situation confronts the Agricultural College of Oregon and the State University, because of the greatly increased number of students, now attending and who subsequently may desire to attend those institutions. The funds that are now appropriated for the support of these institutions are grossly inadequate to the requirements.

There are about two thousand students at the University of Oregon and upwards of three thousand at the Agricultural College, and unless the Millage Tax Bill, which is Number 310 on the ballot shall be carried at the election on Friday, there will be many Oregon students who will not be enabled to attend either of these institutions of learning. There are farmers, and merchants and all other classes of people who desire that their children shall have the advantage of an education, either at the Agricultural College, at the State Normal School or at the State University, but in order that this may be possible, the funds must be supplied by the tax payers of Oregon, and unless all of these classes stand together and vote for the Millage Tax Bill the attendance at these institutions of learning must necessarily be curtailed, and students will be permitted to attend only by selection.

It has been said that the boy or girl who wishes a higher education, will find some way to get it, but this boy or girl must have some higher institution where he or she may attend school, or they will be unable to procure the higher education.

The state University of California and the Stanford University are filled to overflowing and the same is true of the University of Washington and Agricultural College of that state, and in the future students from outside the states of California, Idaho or Washington will not be permitted to attend the Universities in those states. Unless the students are bona fide residents of the state in which they desire to attend school they will not be permitted to attend. In other words the Oregon boy or girl will not be permitted to attend at Berkeley or Stanford, nor at the University or Agricultural College of the State of Washington, and it behooves the people of Oregon, if they wish their children to have the advantage of a higher education to support this Millage Tax Bill, 310 Yes.

If the voter of Oregon fails to do so, it may be his boy or his girl who will be denied the privilege of gratifying a desire for a higher education.

The perpetuity of the institutions of this country depends upon the maintenance of the institutions of learning of the country and it is therefore incumbent upon all of us to support this measure.
