Mrs. J. E. Roberts and daughter, Miss Lydia, were visiting in Phoenix Tuesday.

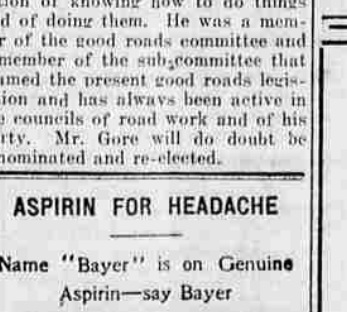
Whooping-cough has made its appearance in Phoenix, and vicinity lately, and many are glad that the school is to close this week.
