COUNTY SENTIMENT TURNS IN FAVOR OF BOND ISSUE

A number of very enthusiastic meetings were held yesterday evening in the county at which the road bond measure and the 4 per cent road bond limitation constitutional amendment were explained. Certain parts of the county are going to vote strong for these measures and the meetings being held is doing much to stir up the people to get them out to vote. Every man or woman who is opposed to the bonds will be at the polls on Friday and therefore it is necessary that every one in favor of the bonds cast their vote, otherwise the same will go down in defeat.

Members of the Advertising Caravan who passed through Medford this morning gave as their opinion that the roads between Medford and Portland were in splendid condition and that if more people who are opposed to bonding for further road improvements could only make the trip, they would realize that they are worth every dollar which it costs to build them.

No man will vote against the county bonds if he has taken the trouble to inform himself as to whether the same will increase his taxes. The county commissioners have issued a statement that it will not increase the taxes for the reason that other road bonds and the warrant indebtedness will be so reduced in the next two years, that the tax now being levied to pay them will be discontinued and the same applied on the proposed road bonds. In fact, the mill rate of taxation in five years now for road bond purposes will be less than it is now.

It is very important that the 4 per cent state road bond limitation act be voted for, because that measure will provide money which will make it possible for us to get state and federal aid in Jackson county. It would be useless for Jackson county to vote the \$500,000 unless we could get \$900,000 of this outside money and therefore, voters should be careful not to overlook that measure on the ballot.

C. OF COMMERCE FAVORS A UNION WITH CENT. POINT

A number of very interesting subjects were taken up at yesterday's Forum all of which affected the welfare of the community as well as the county at large.

During the five minutes allotted for members to bring up such subjects as in their opinion were of immediate importance there were three recommendations made. One was that the board of directors confer with the city authorities relative to the support of the Rogue River Valley band. Another that an effort be made to get out a full vote at the primary election on Friday and the third that Central Point merchants be invited to become members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce and work with them in matters pertaining to the welfare of both communities.

Mr. John A. Mann was the chairman of the day and the subject was that of Trade Expansion which was presented by Secretary H. O. Frohbach. Messrs. Garnett, Gaddis and Isaacs entered into the discussion and a number of very good ideas were advanced for a greater trade expansion. It was the consensus of opinion of all of the speakers that good roads were the biggest factor for trade expansion both from the view point of giving the farmer a better outlet for his products as well as the getting of rural trade for the community.

Mr. Vawter gave assurances to the business men of Central Point who were present, that as soon as the county bonds were voted and it is known that state and federal aid could be obtained, that the Medford Chamber of Commerce could be depended upon to do everything within their power to influence expenditures upon roadways near Central Point, in accordance with the best judgment for all concerned.

The following guests attended the Forum: J. G. Love, E. C. Faber and J. O. Isaacson of Central Point, Benton Bowers of Ashland, J. E. Enyart, a former resident of Medford, but now of Portland, Remy H. Keogy of Portland and H. J. Eberly of Medford, engaged in the state forest service.

As next week will be Forest Protection week, the subject for the forum naturally will be that of the protection of our own forests here in southern Oregon, which is of such vast importance to us and therefore must be given serious consideration as to fire protection.

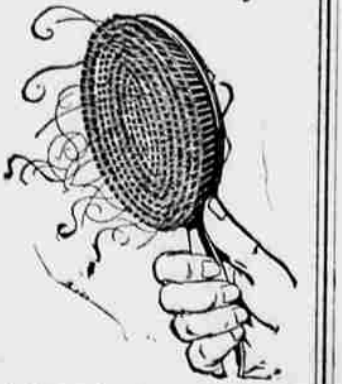

There were a total of one hundred and thirty people with the caravan of which thirty were enlisted men. Besides the touring cars, there were army trucks, motorcycles and a number of other trucks.

The tour is being made to advertise the northwest attractions as well as advocating the use of the Pacific Highway by Californians. In fact, it is constructive effort to sell Oregon scenery to the residents of California.
