COMPANY D IS NOW PLANNING A RIVER PICNIC

The success of last night's ball inures to the people of Medford and vicinity that a good time is always in store for them whenever Company D puts on a public social affair. The large hall was artistically decorated with the national colors, and especially the stage with its large flags, tents, stacks of arms and streamers of red, white and blue.

The National Guard boys are all the more to be congratulated for this success because like a bolt of lightning out of a clear sky Colonel C. E. Dentler, the federal inspector, and Sergeant Bates, federal instructor, unexpectedly arrived in the city late in the afternoon to make a surprise inspection, which at 5 p. m. was ordered for last night. Because of the dance the regular drill for last night had been postponed and the soldiers were busy perfecting the dance arrangements.

Nevertheless the company made a surprisingly good showing under the circumstances, both numerically and otherwise, and Colonel Dentler commended the command highly, and expressed himself as gratified with the way the boys are doing things.

Altho the colonel is a veteran army officer he is one of the greatest boosters for the National Guard, and is doing everything he can for this branch of the service. He was a very welcome guest of the company at the dance after the inspection had been completed.

The company is now planning a banquet, also arranging for the Saturday and Sunday camp at the river. Target practice will soon be commenced and with the new equipment on hand the boys expect to make a fine showing. It is expected that many more of the young men of the city will join, and with the present membership assist in making Company D one of the best companies in the regiment.

J. H. FULLER NEW SEC'Y. OF ASHLAND COMMERCIAL CLUB

ASHLAND, May 21.—J. H. Fuller will be the new secretary of the Ashland Commercial Club, as re-organized, his duties in this respect to begin about June 1. This action has been fore-shadowed for some time past, in view of radical changes, which were announced as following in the wake of the new departure, all the club's former officers being pledged to resign in favor of a new deal throughout, should the membership so desire. The presidency of the club has not yet been indicated, all interest thus far, centering upon the secretaryship, inasmuch as this official's position eclipses that of any other servant in the directorate, due to the prestige of the job and the multiplicity of activities which the place imposes.

Mr. Fuller formerly lived in the vicinity of Talent. Since coming here, he has been manager of the Southern Oregon Chautauqua assembly. Recently he has been in the employ of the Ellison-White bureau on the Chautauqua circuit, his territory being in the south. This employment, however, implied that he would return to Ashland in time to oversee details of the customary July assembly here, duties which may be incorporated in connection with the Commercial Club position this season, at least, as the chautauqua period covers less than a fortnight.

There have been all sorts of surmises as to new quarters for the Commercial Club. The present ones are convenient, but small. Some time ago there was talk of moving to the Elk's building, in quarters formerly occupied by the Red Cross, and installing rest rooms as an adjunct to the club center. Such a change was deemed advisable in order to secure more room, but nothing ever developed in regard to it.

Lynn Mowat, present secretary of the club, has been more than efficient. He is a ready writer, a gift which has been most opportune in connection with boosting publicity phases of the organization. Being well posted on matters relating to athletics, military developments, and civic needs, his assistance in extending a helping hand in behalf of all these objects has been cheerfully extended.
