Limitation of the capacity and speed of trucks as the solution of one of the problems now being faced in the construction of hard surfaced highways, is the prediction made by Herbert S. Nunn, state highway engineer, who says it is not practical to build a highway that will stand up under heavy truck traffic, which would necessitate the expenditure of some \$40,000 to \$50,000 per mile of highway. In order, therefore, to protect the highway for the use of the other class of motor vehicles, the trucks must be curbed. Under a policy recently adopted by the state highway commission, no new grades will be paved hereafter. It has been found that pavement laid on new grades was faulty and unsatisfactory because of the settling of the grade. Under the new policy the commission will not pave until at least two years, and probably three years, after a grade has been completed.

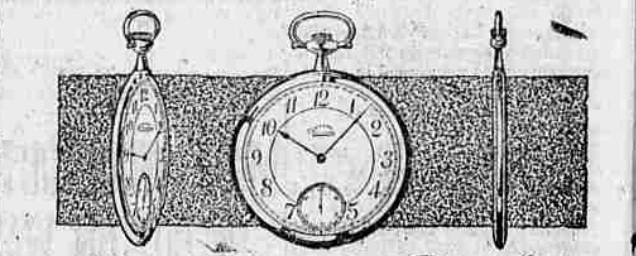

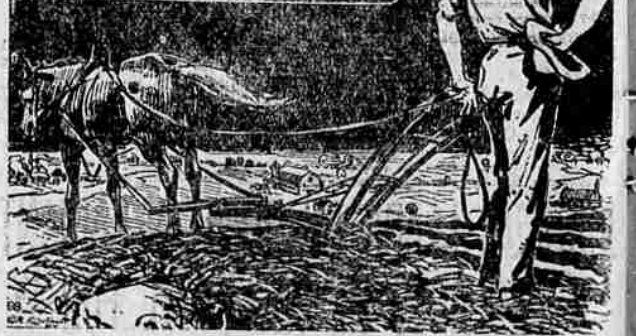
