JACK FOURNIER LEADS NATIONAL LEAGUE BATTERS

CHICAGO, May 29.—Jack Fournier, the former American leaguer now playing first base with the St. Louis Nationals is on a batting rampage which promises to rush him to the front in the National league race.

Fournier participated in 32 games and in 119 times at bat hit out forty times for a total of 48 bases.

Cy Williams, the Philadelphia outfielder, also has made a spurt toward the top. Williams acquired an average of 320 as compared with 276 a week ago. In addition to his batting dash, Williams bagged his fourth circuit drive. His 41 hits include 11 doubles and three triples.

Last week's three batting leaders switched positions, each suffering a slump. Hornaby of St. Louis went to the top with 493, Groh of Cincinnati is runner up with 398 and Nicholson of Pittsburgh third with 380.

Babe Ruth, the New York slugger, broke up the triple tie in the American league for home run honors, by driving out three circuit drives since a week ago Wednesday and now has a total of eight.

Johnson of Cleveland continues to top the batters with 375 while Hendrix of Boston is the runner up with 370.

Rice, of Washington, pulled away from his teammates, Bobby Roth, in stolen bases and is showing the way with four thefts. Roth has pilfered ten.

Ty Cobb, the Detroit star, who last week appeared to have struck his batting stride, suffered a slump and dropped from 277 to 252.

"Yes, by public appeals for funds." "Somewhere around \$50,000 was spent in California then. How was that spent, did you have chautauqua lectures?"

"In four big meetings we paid expenses of speakers," Mr. McCabe replied, adding that printing and circulation of printed matter was the largest item, with little or no money spent on newspaper advertising.

"Did you see any evidence of expenditures by your opponents in the Hoover campaign?" Senator Kenyon asked.

"That was our great anxiety," Mr. McCabe declared. "We didn't know how effective it was going to be. They circularized the whole state once or twice; they had many workers, women as well as men employed in house to house canvasses."

"They were taking whole pages of newspaper advertising and we couldn't tell what we had to do to counteract it."

"They had a tremendous number of workers out of Los Angeles. We had to rely largely on volunteer workers. They had the money and could get them."

"Well, there were some people induced to work by their respect and admiration for Mr. Hoover, weren't there?" Senator Kenyon asked.

"Yes, of course, but there were great numbers employed," returned the witness, who said that in Los Angeles alone Hoover's men had 1600 paid workers.

"Before calling Mr. McCabe the committee questioned Frederic William Wile, a correspondent of the Philadelphia Public Ledger as to an article written by him that \$28,000 had been raised in California for Senator Johnson's primary there."

Johnson Outspen Hoover. Mr. Wile testified that J. H. Rogester, formerly of the shipping board and William H. Crocker of California had been instrumental in raising the alleged fund.

The witness said he had "heard a good deal to the effect that all candidates in California were spending a good deal of money."

"Why didn't you write the Hoover business too?" asked Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri.

Wile said the Philadelphia Public Ledger had "written that up exhaustively when Hoover men were before this committee."

Mr. Wile asserted that estimates of expenses for Hoover in California had not reached anything like the estimates for Johnson.

"I was told," he said, "that the ceiling was the limit for the Johnson campaign."

NEW DRILLER FOR TRIGONIA OIL CO. EXPERIENCED MAN

Drilling, which had been discontinued for the past three weeks at the Trigon Oil & Gas company well while the water supply was being bettered and other alterations and improvements being made, will be resumed next Tuesday with W. P. Shaffstall, the new head drifter, who with his son, A. P. Shaffstall, his assistant, and their wives have arrived here from Los Angeles, in charge.

The hundreds of stockholders of the Trigon company are to be congratulated on the company having obtained the services of such a long experienced, expert oil man as Mr. Shaffstall, who has had active experience in all of the leading oil fields of the country during the past 35 years, and he in turn, says the Trigon crowd is to be congratulated on its rich prospects for striking oil, its equipment and drilling location for the first well.

The fact that Mr. Shaffstall is a very practical and conservative oil man, being more of a worker than talker, gives any utterance from him on Trigon prospects much significance, and what little he has said so far, is very encouraging to the stockholders and officers.

"The more I look over the company's territory and well location, the better I like the outlook," said Mr. Shaffstall in an interview last night. "All the surface indications and log of the Trigon territory are for oil, especially like the looks of the shell formation through which the drill has already gone to a depth of 270 feet. Although I knew somewhat of the lay of the land and the equipment before I came here, I was agreeably surprised when I personally looked over the situation."

In view of the scarcity of oil well drilling equipment throughout the country for a long time past the Trigon company has been very fortunate to get any equipment at all, to say nothing of getting such a splendid outfit as it has. The 12x12 Ajax engine is capable of drilling to most any depth. The company has a larger and better boiler than you will usually find on any single well, and the entire machinery is good throughout.

You know that any new development work in wild cat territory always attracts attention in the proven fields and I had heard much in the past year of this Medford wild cat field. At first when the subject was broached about my coming here to take charge, I didn't warm up to the idea, but the more I investigated the more I liked it, and when I learned that President Chas. Lilly was a brother of Eli Lilly, for whom I had done much drilling work—that cinched it."

In line with its policy of safeguarding the stockholders by getting the best talent available the Trigon company management went after and obtained Mr. Shaffstall as head driller. Both he and his son are sons and members of the Santa Ana, Calif. lodge. Through the influence of E. W. Gilchrist, representative in San Francisco of the Star Drilling Machine company, a practical oil man, for whom Mr. Shaffstall had worked at oil drilling and in a trusted confidential capacity for 15 years, and of Mr. Jose, the geological expert of the Trigon company, he was induced to come here.

Mr. Shaffstall first began drilling in the Pennsylvania Oil fields 35 years ago, and from there went into the Ohio field, drilling in the Lima, Tiffin and Fremont oil and gas sections. Then he spent much time in the Indiana oil and gas field, and in the following order drilled in the Kentucky, Illinois, Kansas, Oklahoma, California, Texas and Wyoming fields. His last drilling before coming here was in the Richfield oil territory in California.

Work will be started on the Trigon well Tuesday with one crew, and if it is found that the increased water supply will warrant it, another crew will be put on. If the water supply does not warrant this, it will be still further increased by drilling in more water wells.
